

# Brazilian Team Defends World Soccer Cup Sun.

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Brazilian coach Arymore Moreira said Friday his team will defend its World Cup soccer title against Czechoslovakia on Sunday without the great Pele. The 21-year-old inside forward was injured in a scoreless match against the Czechs June 2. He suffered a groin injury and has not played since. "Fortunately Pele's absence does not weaken the team," Moreira said. "Amarillo has stepped in brilliantly. He has done a lot better than we expected."

A rido, 21, took over Pele's position and scored the two goals which defeated Spain 2-1 on June 6.

The Czechs have their injury problems. Coach Rolf Vytack said three of his key men were hurt in the semi final game against Yugoslavia — fullback Lala, centre forward Kvasnicka and inside left Kadrabka.

**CONFIDENT OF WIN**

"The absence of those three players will complicate things for us," Moreira said. "But we are confident we can beat them and take the title."

The Brazilians won the World Cup in Sweden in 1958. Nine of the men who helped Brazil to a 5-2 victory over Sweden that year still are on Brazil's team. Inside forward Amarillo and halfback Zimmo are the only two newcomers.

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# Palmer, Rosburg Zoom Ahead Of Faltering Littler

OAKMONT, Pa. (AP)—Favoured Arnold Palmer, with a three-under-par 69, and Bob Rosburg, with a 68, zoomed ahead of faltering Gene Littler Friday to take the halfway lead in the 62nd U.S. national open golf championship with 139 total.

Littler, the defending champion and first-round pace-setter with 69, lost his putting touch and dropped to a 74 for a 143. Hitting the ball superbly from tee to green, Littler ran into

repeated frustrations on Oakmont's massive, hump-naked greens. He tripped the first hole, hit on birdie putts of six to eight feet and hit a climax of fury when he dubbed an easy two-footer for the one-over-par six on the 596-yard 12th.

Littler's face seemed to pale and his shoulders sag when the putt lipped the cup and veered

away. Until then he had knocked in 19 straight par but didn't have a birdie on the round.

**FACE TOUGH CLIMAX**

Facing today's exhausting double-round climax over the par-71 Oakmont Country Club course, Palmer and Rosburg had a two-stroke advantage over Littler, who scrambled to a 70 for 11.

Three players are another

shot back at 142. They are Jack Nicklaus, who had a 70, South Africa's Gary Player, with his second straight 71, and young Bobby Nichols, 72.

Player, like Littler, couldn't sink a putt while the 26-year-old Nichols, a tournament surprise, had a stroke over par on each of three of the last four holes when it appeared he might tie for the lead. He three-putted the 18th from 15 feet after his putt struck the hole.

Casualties included former open champion Bill Casper Jr. at 184, Ed Furgol at 156 and Tommy Bolt at 152. Sam Snead had an even 150 after a second round 74.
