THE Charlottetown Engineers will parade at Kensington Rifle Range on Saturday afternoon next, at 2 o'clock sharp, for Company's target practice. The "Hooper Challenge Cup" and several nice prizes will be offered for competition. REV. JAMES CARRUTHERS, Alex. McNeill, Esq., Cavendish, Chester B. McNeill, of Sullivan & McNeill, and Jas. L. Thompson, Esq., P. E. I. R., have returned home after "doing" the Indian and Colonial Exhibition as well as the principal points of interest in the Old Country. They look well. THE Protestant Union says that Mr. John MacKenzie, merchant tailor of Summerside, has been the recipient of a beautiful silver medal from the Indian and Colonial Exhibition in London, for the best suit of gents' clothing. He had previously received diplomas from Paris, Philadelphia and Montreal. TUESDAY'S storm was very severe in Moncton, N. B. The rain fell in torrents, the thunder was something terrible, and the lightning very vivid. The schooner Clara, Haley captain, lying at the public wharf, was struck by lightning, the electric fluid knocking off the ball and making a small hole in the mainmast. The damage is slight. A woman living on the Fox Creek road was stunned by the lightning but seriously hurt. WE have received from Mr. E. Tonyce, director of the New England Conservatory Music, a beautifully printed quarto pamphlet which has a more than passing value, and puts so plainly forth the past, the present, and the prospective conditions of this now vast institution that it is worth examining and preserving by all who are interested in educational matters in general, even if they have little predilection for those special studies which give this establishment its name. A GENTLEMAN from Malpeque informs us that the thunder, lightning and hail storm which passed over that place Tuesday played sad havoc with the grain, potato and turnip crops—mowing down everything in its way. The oxen for miles round were covered with hail stones as large as marbles. Almost all the windows of Mr. A. Ellison's dwelling were broken, and fishermen were obliged to cover themselves with sails so as to prevent their being seriously injured by the flying stones. MRS. PRESIDENT CLEVELAND'S marriage certificate will, when it is finished, be a very interesting document. It rests on a bed of blue velvet, in an alligator portfolio, about 12 inches long and 8 inches wide. In the upper left hand corner of the certificate is a very pretty picture of the White House. The certificate issued by Dr. Sunderland in the portfolio is now being sent round to all who were present at the wedding that they may sign it as witnesses. Several of the members of the cabinet and the members of their families who saw the wedding have already signed. A FEW weeks ago, Marshall Flynn received a circular from a detective agency in Chicago, asking him to look out for a man named Rudolph Schnaubelt, one of the worst Socialists in Chicago, and for whom the detectives were searching. That Schnaubelt is now beyond earthly capture is very evident from a recent Erie, Pa., despatch, which says that the dead body of a man found there in the bay is now believed to be that of Rudolph Schnaubelt, who threw the bomb into the ranks of the police in the Haymarket riot, in Chicago, on the night of May 4. The despatch asserts that the clothing and general appearance of the corpse correspond exactly to the published description of the bomb-thrower. Schnaubelt's death is attributed to suicide, due to fear of detection. The body was in an advanced stage of decomposition when found.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] An Ex-President Dead. NEW YORK, Aug. 5. Hon. Samuel J. Tilden is dead. His death, which was sudden and unexpected, resulted from weakness caused by diarrhoea. In 1876 Mr. Tilden was the candidate of the Democratic party in the presidential election. He received a majority of the votes, but was not seated owing to the action of the electoral commission who threw out the vote of Louisiana and declared the usurper Hayes elected. This action on the part of the commission, it was feared, would result in bloodshed, but owing to the dignified action and wise counsels of Mr. Tilden such was prevented, though a very bitter feeling was engendered, and to this day he is looked upon and spoken of as a rightful President of the United States, even a portion of the Republican press admitting that he had been elected de jure et de facto. An Attempt to Skeddadle. SHELBURNE, N. S., Aug. 5. The American schooner Rattler, of Gloucester, narrowly escaped from capture yesterday. She was anchored in this harbor and Capt. Quigley had put an armed guard of two men on board for the night. The Rattler attempted to put to sea with the Canadian tar aboard. They, however, fired off their revolvers as signals of distress and the arrival of a boat's crew from the cruiser, soon convinced the Yankee skipper of the folly of his proposed course. Sad Ending of a Pleasure Party. PORTLAND, Aug. 5. Fifteen people, all related to each other, started in two small boats for a day's pleasure-seeking in the harbor yesterday. One of the boats was capsized by a sudden gust of wind and seven of the party were drowned. The names of the unfortunate are Wellington Masters, aged 71; Miss Jane Masters, aged 62; Jane Masters, aged 9; Emma Cleveland, aged 12; and her brother aged 7; Maud Whitten, aged 12; and her little brother aged 7. Grits Again Worsted. HALIFAX, Aug. 5. The Grits turned the meeting of the shareholders of the Cotton Factory into a ward caucus, but failed ignominiously to carry a resolution censuring Manager Stevenson for having taken a prominent part in the recent Provincial elections and for having denounced Repealers as traitors. A Riot in "cutchawed" Boston. BOSTON, Aug. 5. A serious riot over labor troubles occurred at Squire & Co.'s pork packing establishment here. One policeman and one rioter were killed and several others seriously injured. Squire & Co. refuse to make any concessions. Probable Retirement of Gladstone. LONDON, Aug. 5. Mr. Gladstone says that he must have rest and repose. It is believed that this foreshadows his retirement from active political life. The First Break. BIRMINGHAM, Aug. 5. The Radicals will oppose the re-election of Home Secretary Matthews. This is the first break in the Tory-unionism programme. A Magnificent Demonstration. DUBLIN, Aug. 5. The farewell demonstration to Lord Aberdeen has not been equalled since the times of O'Connell. One Million per Day. WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5. He talks freely and sensibly, and at present gives no appearance of being in a dying condition, but the doctors declare he cannot live.
