New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market surged ahead again last week in the midst of growing speculative interest.

Volume is mounting. Low-priced speculative issues are coming to the fore in place of the higher-priced blue-chip stocks. There is evidence that a public is beginning to take a hand in stock market affairs alongside the professionals.

Wall street is bullish, and brokers have a lot of arguments to back up their opinions.

As a basic factor, they point to a currently good business. And, they feel, better business is coming. That to them means sustained earnings and dividends, the very basis for stock prices.

Also, the stock market was helped along last week by favorable tax action in Washington and by a Wall street contention that the growing tension in Indo-China may eventually be translated into increased American defence spending.

Monday's market was a little higher with steel and aircrafts outstanding. The low-priced stock shares staged a rally on Tuesdays when the progress as a whole made a little progress.

A slight setback came on Wednesday, and on the final two days of the week the market swept forward in most active issues this week on the New York stock exchange were: Greyhound off 1 1/2 at 23 1/2; North American Aviation up 3/4 at 31 1/2; U. S. Steel up 3/4 at 73 1/2; and International Telephone up 1 1/2 at 17 1/2.

The advance in Canadian issues was led by Distillers' Seagram which gained 3/4 at the week-end. Canadian Pacific, Dome Mines and Hiram Walker advanced 1/4.

On the American stock exchange Royalite Oil dropped 3/4 and Giant Yellowknife slipped 3/4. Lake Shore was up 3/4.

U. S. Steel Report

CLEVELAND (AP)—Steel production gained two more points last week, its highest level since the first week in March, Steel magazine reports.

In its weekly summary of the owners and pilots' association said present flying regulations are adequate if enforced.

The 1,000-member Association of Private and Commercial Pilots and Small Plane Owners was referring to the 37-death collision of a Trans-Canada ACF Lines North Star and Royal Air Force plane over Moose Jaw, Sask.

The association said it understands a new regulation is being considered which would require all non-airline aircraft, both civil and military, to obtain clearance before crossing an airway.

"This would practically assign the airways from the ground up to the scheduled airlines. These suggested changes to the air regulations would appear to be, in our opinion, an attempt to cover up the responsibility for the accident in which one aircraft may be just as much to blame as the other."

"The visibility was good and regardless of who had the right-of-way, the two pilots should have seen the Harvard."

"The cockpit visibility in the larger airline aircraft is not good enough and should be improved. . . . Some type of radar device should be perfected which would advise pilots in flight of the proximity of other aircraft."

Immigration Shows Increase Of 23 Per Cent

OTTAWA (CP)—About 15,000 workers were injected into the Canadian working force during the first quarter of this year, as immigration showed an increase.

The immigration department Wednesday announced that arrivals in the first three months rose 23 per cent to 28,223 from 22,937 in the corresponding period last year.

Of these 6,713 dependents, jobs, mostly in manufacturing, construction, agriculture or service industries.

The immigration department said 4,161 immigrants found work in manufacturing and mechanical and construction work, 2,269 as laborers, 2,577 in agriculture and 2,501 in service industries.

The immigration department gave this break-down by sexes and ages of arrivals in the first quarter of the year: adult males, 11,957; adult females, 9,555; children under 15 years, 6,713. Dependents, wives totalled 5,304; dependent children, 6,324 and other dependents 856.

Ontario Popular

The largest group were headed for Ontario destinations, totalling 16,389. Those bound for British Columbia totalled 2,235; Alberta 2,154; Manitoba 1,095; Saskatchewan 536; Yukon and Northwest Territories 19.

Slight drops in the number of arrivals in the three-month period from the United States and northern Europe were more than offset by a 66 per cent jump to 9,773 from 5,870 in arrivals from other countries and a 24 per cent increase to 7,882 from 6,367 in arrivals of English, Irish, Scottish and Welsh.

A big contributor to the 66 per cent boost from other countries was an increase to 6,156 from 2,972 in arrivals of Italians. Among the non-European groups, the largest single category was of Germans, which dropped to 3,674 from 4,173.

Two Police In Greenlease Case Get Prison Terms

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Two St. Louis policemen who captured the Bobby Greenlease kidnapers were sentenced to prison Friday for lying to a federal grand jury about
