Preliminary Hearing In Harold Lee Case Opens

The preliminary hearing of the case against Harold Clement Lee, charged with theft and public mischief, opened yesterday morning before Magistrate K.M. Martin. Only one witness was heard and the case was then adjourned until this morning.

Before the questioning of witnesses, counsel for the accused raised some points of law and objections, submitting that he considered the case was not being heard in the proper court and also the charge was laid under the wrong section of the code. He also maintained the information was uncertain and therefore should be void.

The court found the objections to be insufficient to quash the information. Counsel then said that there was a vagueness regarding the amount of money involved, it merely being referred to as being over a hundred dollars; he also wished to have a list of the denominations of the bills and how many of each. From the evidence it was later revealed that the amount in question totalled \$53.22.

The Magistrate then asked the accused to elect as to how he wished to be tried. On the advice of counsel he elected trial by judge and jury.

ONLY WITNESS YESTERDAY The only witness to be called, Auguste Savoy, Superintendent of the Anglin-Norcross (Maritime) Limited explained the duties of Lee in his capacity of time-keeper and paymaster on the Federal Building project and of the system employed for the drawing and handling of the payroll and petty cash accounts. He told of the events which took place at the job site on the morning of the alleged holdup prior to the accused going to the bank. He said that he had signed two cheques for Intyre and Lynne Hayes, both of Charlottetown, tied for 3rd.

Judgments In Supreme Court

At a sitting of the Supreme Court yesterday morning Justice M.R. MacGulgan delivered judgment in two cases which arose out of highway accidents.

Edna Jenkins vs. Island Motor Transport Co. The Plaintiff was a passenger on defendant's bus on June 28, 1953. She alleged the bus stopped suddenly and she was thrown against the seat in front of her thereby receiving damages to her mouth, teeth and other injuries. The driver of the bus maintained it was necessary to stop quickly to avoid another vehicle approaching from a side road and he did all that was reasonable. The Court found in favor of the Plaintiff and awarded her \$450.00 and costs. She had extensive dental accounts as well as suffering because of the accident.

G. R. Foster represented the Plaintiff and H. F. MacPhee, Q. C., the defendant company. In the other case Wilmut Miller had sued Rae Kennedy and Kennedy had also sued Miller and Webster Clow all in connection with same collision. Miller's truck was stopped on the highway between Murray River

and Murray Harbour North at or shortly after dark on Sept. 27th, 1954 because it had run out of gas. There were no lights showing on the truck. A friend of his Clow had brought his car up facing Miller's and they were in the act of putting gasoline in Miller's truck when the Kennedy truck came up behind the Miller stalled truck.

The lights were on dim in Clow car facing on an angle to the Miller truck. Kennedy, the driver of approaching truck claims he did not see the stalled Miller truck as he was overtaking it and collided heavily with it; possibly partly because of the lights on Clow car interfering with his visibility. Kennedy truck received the more damage. It struck the Miller parked truck which in turn damaged the Clow car in front of it.

The Court found the parties equally negligent in all the circumstances but as Kennedy received the much greater damages to his vehicle he was awarded \$440.00 and one half his taxed costs. H. F. MacPhee, Q. C. represented Miller and Clow. G. R. Foster represented Miller and Clow.

A friend of his Clow had brought his car up facing Miller's and they were in the act of putting gasoline in Miller's truck when the Kennedy truck came up behind the Miller stalled truck.

The lights were on dim in Clow car facing on an angle to the Miller truck. Kennedy, the driver of approaching truck claims he did not see the stalled Miller truck as he was overtaking it and collided heavily with it; possibly partly because of the lights on Clow car interfering with his visibility. Kennedy truck received the more damage. It struck the Miller parked truck which in turn damaged the Clow car in front of it.

The Court found the parties equally negligent in all the circumstances but as Kennedy received the much greater damages to his vehicle he was awarded \$440.00 and one half his taxed costs. H. F. MacPhee, Q. C. represented Miller and Clow. G. R. Foster represented Miller and Clow.
