## Anderson, Sigsworth Address 'Hootenanny'

"Over and over again we are notified by young people through-out Second King's that untainted political integrity and selfless dedication to the people's welfare, by their elected representatives, are only two of the essential qualities of a politician that, for far too long, appear to have been all but completely disregarded in certain facets of our political life. And this, young people deplore, is particularly evident at that very level where the first contact of those elected to administer public affairs is made with the voters who elect them. An urgent duty, therefore, is placed upon all conscientious young people, whether of voting age now or not, to enlist freely all of that same youthful energy, and enthusiasm, which are so freely dedicated here tonight to executing 'the watusi' and 'the shake', in the none less exhausting battle against political staidness."

"These youthful qualities are most effective weapons in the total war against everything that smacks of dingy ward politics, the selfish quest for personal political gain, tyrannous political control, and cruel disregard for the personal welfare of the people". Don Anderson and Frank Sigsworth, Liberal candidates in Second King's, informed a Political Hootenanny in the Morell Community Hall Saturday night.

"The Twelve Point Liberal Program of our energetic young Liberal Leader, Alex Campbell, is aimed, in many respects, at helping young people to equip themselves adequately for the task of helping to remove from our political life, any festering sores of political perversity that may now infect it," Don Anderson told his young audience in part. "With the voting age lowered to eighteen, and educational opportunities improved, after May 30th by the new Liberal Government, you will all have an even more important and demanding role to play in ensuring our political integrity. The youth of Second King's show eagerness to assume their new responsibilities, and so join freely in the Island-wide Liberal swing," said the 38 year old St. Peter's farmer.

"When election campaign distortion, together with outright political guile and deception lead to such a contemptably low level that, among other things, even government welfare assistance cheques are used as bait for vote-catching," said Mr. Sigsworth, "then all thoughtful people French and English folklore and a number of popular and Negro spiritual selections. ## Interaction Discussed At Meeting

At the recent meeting of the Home and School Association in Fort Augustus, Mrs. Vernon Bolger, guest speaker for the meeting, speaking on child-parent interaction, pointed out the importance of a loving child-parent relationship especially during the early formative years of the child. Using the findings of several extensive research programs carried out on this continent and abroad during the past quarter of a century, Mrs. Bolger stated that the child has a great need for very intensive loving early in life. Given this, the child builds up a trust fund of love during his first five or six years and this warmth of love is absolutely essential for normal psychological development.

Studies have shown that young children separated from their parents are often shattered by the experience and suffer acute trauma. Many such children suffer mental retardation because even the ability to learn is affected by the presence or absence of a loving child-parent relationship, a relationship which is of vital importance to mental health.

A vote of thanks was extended to Mrs. Bolger and following lunch, the usual parent-teacher period was held.

## Renault Talks With Russia

MOSCOW (AP) - A 10-man group from France's Renault auto company arrived in Moscow Monday for talks with Soviet officials about possible cooperation in car production.

The group leader, Export Director Michel Maisson, said the group came at Soviet invitation and awaits Soviet proposals. He expects to remain here until the end of the week "but that all depends on our talks," he told a reporter at the airport.

Talks begin today with D. M. Gvishiani, a son-in-law of Premier Alexei Kosygin. Gvishiani is a deputy chairman of the state committee for science and technology.

The Soviet government recently signed an agreement with the Fiat company of Italy to build a factory that will produce 2,000 cars a day, more than the total current output of the Soviet Union.
