2nd Maritime Conference On Cerebral Palsy Planned

Representatives from Sydney, Halifax, Charlottetown, Saint John, Fredericton and Toronto gathered recently in Moncton to plan for the second annual conference on cerebral palsy. The meeting was held at the new Mentally Retarded and Cerebral Palsy School. Mrs. John Worth, teacher at the Cerebral Palsy Centre, and Miss Hazel Hunter represented the Charlottetown parent group. S. Biani, Moncton, presided, while Dr. Keith Armstrong, national executive director, Canadian Council for Crippled Children and Adults, and Miss Amy Elliott, social worker in Halifax, outlined a tentative program for the conference. Set for Fredericton from June 1 to 3, the conference will have as its theme "Cerebral palsy — a family problem." Cecil Wagg, Saint John, N.B., will preside over the sessions which will hear doctors, physiotherapists, social workers, speech therapists, teachers and parents explore the problems caused by cerebral palsy. They will also outline treatment methods and programs to assist children suffering from this condition.

While in Moncton, Mrs. Worth spent a day observing teaching methods and techniques in both the retarded and cerebral palsy classrooms of the newly erected school.

The first Maritime conference had an attendance of approximately 100 persons. On the recommendation of members, it was decided to ask Newfoundland to join the conference this year.

2nd Education Conference Delegation Meets Tuesday

The preparations for Prince Edward Island's representation at the Second Canadian Conference on Education are now all but completed. Rev. E.J. Roche, chairman of the P.E.I. Education Conference's public relations committee, has announced that the Island's 27 delegates representing some 11 provincial and national organizations are scheduled to meet at Montgomery Hall at 8 p.m. Tuesday night, Feb. 13. At this meeting the delegates will assemble first in groups chosen according to their interest in the various sections of the Montreal conference. They will then meet in a general session to put the final touches to the presentation of the P.E.I. educational picture in the national setup. The week-long conference itself is scheduled to open at 8 p.m. on Sunday, Mar. 4, in the Queen Elizabeth Hotel in Montreal. Some 2,000 Canadian delegates will attend.

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Light Snow, High Wind Makes Visibility Poor

Light snow accompanied by strong winds played havoc with visibility during the weekend but main roads remained open through the efforts of snow plow operators who cleared stretches of road where the going was reported to be heavy. Snowfall in the Summerside area amounted to approximately five inches with winds reaching 64 m.p.h. last night. Traffic was running freely last night although some of the secondary roads in the area were blocked as plows were busy on the main highways. Although winds were strong in West Prince County, little or no snow fell in the Alberton area. Some heavy drifts were reported in Kings County but all main roads were open. The radio range at the Charlottetown airport reported that approximately 2.4 inches of snow fell accompanied by winds reaching 50 m.p.h. 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Music Festival Is Soliciting Memberships For Finances

The P.E.I. Music Festival Association solicits the assistance of every citizen who believes that the "love of music must be made to flourish among our people" states a release from Mrs. T.A. Laidlaw, convener for the music festival which is held annually in the spring. It was emphasized that the financial success of the festival depends on its membership; it requires a considerable amount of money to maintain the organization, and the officers are faced with the annually increasing number of contestants. Early in the season letters are to the Women's Institutes, choirs, Home and School Associations, Junior Farm groups and the Catholic Women's Leagues. The organizations join as groups for five dollars, it was stated, and are therefore eligible to five voting members if these names are submitted with their fees. Individual membership may be obtained for one dollar, it continued. Each member is then permitted to purchase for 50 cents, season tickets for entrance to all sessions not included in the annual concerts. It was emphasized that the members are entitled to attend all public meetings, and that an early reply assists the membership committee financially, and enables it to submit an accurate list for publication in the annual program.
