Burton Resident Faces Charges

ALBERTON — A resident of Burton, Carl O'Brien appeared before W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton yesterday on four separate charges laid by O'Leary policeman Gerald Shaw. Represented by Melville Campbell, O'Brien pleaded not guilty of driving without due care and attention; failing to stop when signalled to do so by a police officer; driving in a manner dangerous to the public and unlawfully and wilfully obstructing police officer Gerald Shaw in the execution of his duty in arresting Carl O'Brien for dangerous driving. Shirley O'Brien, also represented by Melville Campbell, pleaded not guilty of obstructing police officer Shaw in the execution of his duty in arresting Carl O'Brien. All cases were adjourned to April 27. Two Tignish residents, Alphonse Richard and Joseph Lloyd Myers were fined \$10 and

Lions Meeting Held Recently

King Lion Joseph E. "Sonny" Johnson, presided over a regular meeting of the Georgetown Lions Club held in the Club Room on Tuesday night. Guests at the meeting were five members of the Charlottetown Lions Club, who recovered their gong from the Georgetown Club.

King Lion Johnson gave a financial statement of the receipts from the last three dances held as well as the receipts from the canteen, held in connection with the weekly dances.

Correspondence included letters from Lions International regarding Lions visits and Club pins that have been ordered; a catalogue on playground equipment; a letter from Deputy District Governor, Wolf Marold of Souris regarding the "Bill Brown for Governor" Kick-Off Campaign. \$50 Fine Is Levied

There were 10 convictions of drunk and disorderly as well as a similar number of convictions under the Liquor Control Act. Convictions of theft under \$50 saw only two while a charge of obtaining food saw one conviction. Motor vehicle accidents investigated over \$100 numbered 21 while those under \$100 totalled 14. There were 97 summonses served during the month.
