Lower Profits level reported by Boscos

MONTREAL (CP) — Dominion Steel and Coal Corp. Ltd. has reported reduced sales volume, both in export and domestic markets, as a result of its profit of \$11,207, or 38 cents a share, in 1961. The company had net profit of \$46,192, or 16 cents a share, in the five months ended Dec. 31, 1961 and net profit of \$2,475,816, or \$1.17 a share, in the year ended July 31, 1960.

The company, which through subsidiaries is engaged in mining coal and iron ore, manufacturing steel and steel products and operation of shipping, reported in its annual report other factors as well as lower sales contributed to the lower level of profits.

Among these, it mentioned the "unsatisfactory" performance of the Halifax Shipyards, further deteriorated by a nine-week strike, and the competitive squeeze in the steel fabrication field.

The outlook for 1962 indicates a general improvement in our position," the report said. Shipping operations and the manufacture of steel products and railway rolling stock were expected to show improvement in 1962.

However, Bell Island iron ore operations "will still be at a level well below existing capacity" because of reduced demand from Canadian industry, the company's structural steel subsidiary, would continue to suffer from the price squeeze at that industry.

The company, controlled by A. V. Roe Canada Ltd., is in an "extremely sound" financial position, the report said. Working capital at Dec. 31 was \$55,077,861, compared with \$55,228,361 a year earlier. Retained earnings at the end of 1961 amounted to \$46,701,492, compared with \$46,832,729 a year earlier.

Operating earnings in 1961 were shown as \$8,742,777, compared with \$9,857,107 in the five months ended Dec. 31, 1960 and \$14,634,717 in the year ended July 31, 1960.

CONCENTRATE ON TRENTON

The report said rail car building operations at Trenton, N.J., should increase in 1962 as A. V. Roe has decided to concentrate car-building facilities in the Trenton works. It also mentioned "the agreement" to some increase in buying on the part of Canadian users, as well as negotiations by A. V. Roe with the Argentine state railroads for the sale of 2,000 box cars.

when he led a tramp; otherwise, South would have taken the contract easily. East took the ace and returned a trump, taken in dummy.

Declarer led a club to the queen and West made a good play again when he ducked. If he had taken the ace, South would have made ten tricks without much effort (a spade, a spade ruff, five hearts, a diamond and two clubs).

South was not at the critical point in the play. He realized that if he could establish the ace of spades and then ruffed a spade in dummy, he would inevitably come to a dead end and go down one. He would eventually lose three spade tricks by playing in the fashion.

He also knew by this time approximately how the opponents' cards were divided. East had shown up with the ace of hearts and was marked by the bidding with a long string of diamonds. West had to have the ace of clubs and the missing spade strength for his double. All there remained for South to do was to take advantage of this knowledge.

He first led the ace of diamonds and then the queen of diamonds. West took the king and returned a diamond. Declarer ruffed the diamond and then trumped a spade in dummy. Next he led the king of clubs and discarded a spade on it.

West had to take the ace, but was now reduced to an unpleasant 4-3-2-2 distribution. He was forced to lead either a club to dummy's jack or a spade to declarer's A. As either play was bound to give South a ten-trick trick.
