

Yankees Sweep Series; Red Sox Now In Cellar

New York Yankees finally escaped from the American League cellar by beating Washington 3-0 Sunday while Baltimore dropped Boston into last place with a 2-1 defeat.

The Yankee sweep of the three-game series at Washington also sent New York ahead of the Senators into sixth place, still four games below the 500 mark.

Cleveland maintained its one-game lead over Chicago despite a 7-4 defeat at the hands of Detroit on Charlie Maxwell's three-run homer off Jim Perry in the ninth. Chicago also lost, bowing to Kansas City 9-1 as Early Wynn was routed in a five-run second inning.

CLOSE IN ON BRAVES
San Francisco moved within 2½ games of the pace-setting Milwaukee Braves in the National League. The Giants whipped Chicago 6-3 behind Johnny Antonelli while Milwaukee split two against Philadelphia. Robin Roberts shut out the Braves with four hits in the opener 6-0, but Warren Spahn won his 2-1 with a matching four-

batter in the second game. Los Angeles turned back St. Louis 5-3 with Sandy Koufax and Danny McDevitt striking out 14 Cardinals. Dodger pitchers now have struck out 90 batters in the last 10 games. As St. Louis pitchers also fanned nine, the total of 23 tied a National League record for a single game.

Pittsburgh hit eight home runs while thumping Cincinnati twice 6-2 and 14-1. Smokey Burgess and Don Hoak, a pair of former Reds, each hit three and Bob Skinner two, one a grand slammer.

YANKS LEAVE CELLAR
Bill Skowron boosted the Yanks out of the basement with a three-run homer in the ninth off Camilo Pascual who had been locked in a scoreless battle with Bob Turley. Turley finished with a two-hitter. Pascual had allowed only two hits until Mickey Manley doubled with two out in the ninth. Jerry Davis started Detroit's winning rally with a single off Mike Garcia. After he was moved to second on a sacrifice, Perry came in. He walked Harvey Kuenn intentionally before Max-

well hit his three-run blast. It was Davis's first complete game in the majors, a four-hitter.

Whitey Herzog's two-run single and Dick Williams' two-run double were the big blows for Kansas City in their second inning spurt. Preston Ward hit his first homer of the year with the bases loaded off Barry Lutzman in the sixth. Ned Garver allowed only four hits while winning his fourth.

Hal (Skinny) Brown turned back Boston with four hits after a shaky start while the Orioles got to Ike DBlock for 11 hits. Al Piliarek's double and Willie Tisby's single broke a 1-1 tie in the sixth.

NEEDED HELP
Antonelli needed a little help from Stu Miller in the ninth after striking out 11 Cubs. It was the left-hander's seventh victory. Antonelli also hit a three-run double off loser Glen Hobbie in the second.

Roberts' shutout was his first complete game since April 22 and his 20th big league victory. Spahn won his 253rd, tying Carl Hubbell's total in the National League.

Skinner drove in seven runs in the second game victory for Pittsburgh after Burgess and Hoak each hit two homers in the opener. At the end of a long after-

noon he Pirates had moved within 4½ games of Milwaukee.

In Saturday action, the White Sox rallied for two runs in the ninth inning to win the second game of a doubleheader against Detroit 4-3. The Tigers won the opener 4-2.

A ninth-inning rally also gained Cleveland Indians a split with Kansas City. Cleveland won the first 3-2 and Kansas City the nightcap 3-1.

In other AL games, Boston Red Sox took two from Baltimore, 5-4 and 8-3, and New York Yankees crushed Washington twice, 11-2 and 11-0.

Milwaukee Braves continued their winning ways in the National League, beating Philadelphia 4-2. Pittsburgh beat Cincinnati 3-1 and San Francisco whipped Chicago Cubs 5-2.

Los Angeles Dodgers beat St. Louis Cardinals 7-6 in their night game at Los Angeles with ninth-inning homers by Ron Fairly and Gil Hodges.

Rodger Ward Sets New Mark In Capturing Indianapolis

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)—Rodger Ward, 33, the Beau Brummel of auto racing, gunned his Leader Card Special to a record-breaking triumph in the 43rd 500-mile speedway race Saturday.

Ward's first speedway victory in nine starts came with a masterful display of consistent driving by the Los Angeles veteran, who controlled the race from the 82nd lap of the 200-lap grind.

The defending champion, Jimmy Bryan, left the post late and had to quit in the second lap of the thrilling speed contest.

In beating out runner-up Jim Rathmann of Miami by 23 seconds, Ward pushed his streak while racer at a 135.857 mile-an-hour average. This broke the 1957 record of 135.601 m.p.h. set by Sam Hanks of Pacific Palisades, Calif.

The pole car driver, Johnny Thomson of Boyertown, Pa., was third in a race that had five accidents with two serious injuries but no deaths.

Tony Bettenhausen of Tinley Park, Ill., was fourth and Paul Goldsmith of St. Clair Shores, Mich., fifth.

WORTH \$100,000
The victory unofficially is worth \$100,000 to Ward's car. The driver normally gets 40 per cent. A total purse of about \$600,000 was to be sliced at Sunday's victory dinner.

Only 16 of the 33 cars that started were still running at the finish of the race.

Ward required only three pit stops—of 23, 24 and 26 seconds.

George Bradley, first sacker for the Aces, had a perfect day at the plate, hitting 3 for 3.

Donnie 'Funnel' MacLean upped the first game and Donnie Whalen, the second.
