Letter From St. Laurent To 10 Premiers

OTTAWA (CP)—Text of Prime Minister St. Laurent's letter to the premiers on federal-provincial fiscal arrangements, dated March 8.

In my letter to you of Jan. 14, I said that I would be writing again after my return from London with a view to working out arrangements for a federal-provincial fiscal conference later this year.

Following further consideration of the matter with my colleagues, I am writing now to you to propose that we hold a preliminary meeting here in Ottawa shortly after Easter, say, April 21 and 22, if those days are convenient to all of us.

I suggest that the purpose of this preliminary meeting should be to reach some conclusions on the board outline of the agenda for the main conference and to decide upon an opening date.

I am sure we all agree that the main conference will be an important occasion, and that to be successful, a good deal of careful thought and study should go into the preparations for it.
