

Rocket Richard Scores 500th Goal On Saturday

MONTEAL (CP) — Maurice (Rocket) Richard, at 38 the oldest player in the National Hockey League, fired the 500th goal of his illustrious career Saturday night as Montreal Canadiens downed Chicago Black Hawks 3-1.

The fiery French-Canadian star sent a crowd of 14,406 into a frenzied demonstration when he blasted a slapshot past goalie Glen Hall of the Hawks at 16:52 of the first period and added to a record no one even approaches.

Closest to Richard were Detroit Red Wings' great scorer, who had 354 when Richard bagged No. 500.

The Rocket's history-making goal came in his 863rd game of regular-season NHL play. He has scored 70 goals in Stanley Cup playoffs, and now in the early stages of his 66th season he has a combined total of 570.

CANADIENS IN FIRST
Richard's goal was the first of the night. Laker Montreal goals by Doug Harter, and Jean Beliveau, before Hec Lalande scored late in the third period for the Hawks, were an anti-climax for the victorious Canadiens.

Their win gave them sole occupancy of first place in the NHL standing. They have won four games and tied two in six starts.

The incomparable Rocket, whose scoring wizardry is as

amazing as ever, was all geared up for the glitter goal that Montreal fans felt was bound to come Saturday night. Starting this season he had a total of 492. In five games he scored six goals and it seemed almost a certainty the Rocket would produce the magic goal before hometown fans Saturday.

He didn't disappoint them. Every time he was on the ice in the first period he prowled the Chicago end, darting and whirling as his mates tried to feed him the big pass.

THE BREAK PLAY
The break came after defence-man Ian Cushman of the Hawks was given a penalty for holding the Rocket. Montreal's famed power play went into action.

Dickie Moore relayed the puck to big Jean Beliveau, near the side of the Chicago net. Beliveau whipped a diagonal pass to Richard, about 20 feet straight out from Hall. The Rocket let go a slapshot in stride. The puck whizzed past Hall only a few inches off the ice.

The crowd let loose with great roars of acclaim. Montreal players hugged and pummeled the Rocket. Linesman George Hayes sped to the Hawk net, retrieved the history-making puck and handed it to Richard.

The Rocket took his regular

turns on the ice thereafter and several times came close to scoring again.

When the game ended newspaper men and photographers swarmed into the Montreal dressing room. Rocket's six-year-old son Normand was there also to congratulate his dad.

Rocket said he wasn't at all nervous about getting the big goal "but I really did want to get it in front of the Montreal fans and I'm glad things happened the way they did."

Jean Beliveau, who set up the all-important pass, said: "That's one assist I'll never forget in my life. I saw the Rocket out there as someone tried to check me. I let the pass go. The puck went between somebody's legs. It didn't leave the ice. I saw the Rocket take the pass and shoot. That was it."

Peculiarly enough, the Black Hawks have been Richard's victims five times in the high spots of his career. Goals No. 100, 200, 400 and 500 were scored against the Hawks and so was goal No. 325, the goal that broke the former all-time NHL record held by the late Neil Stewart of the old Montreal Maroons. Goal No. 300 was against Detroit Red Wings and No. 324, equalling the old record, against Toronto Maple

Jolly Lad Lowers Mark

HALIFAX (CP) — Jolley Lad, the trim chestnut pacing gelding that whipped around the track in 2:08 3-5 last week, equalled its mark again Saturday night, and later in the evening he shaved 1-8 of a second off that record.

He was the only double winner at Sackville Downs Saturday, but several other horses broke their own records. The Summerside, P.E.I. pacer, Little River Mark, established a new record of 2:14 3-5. New Forest, owned by E. A. Bernard of Hunter River, P.E.I., lowered his record to 2:14 1-4.

Howard Defeats Jackie Hayden

STELLARTON, N.S. (CP) — Richard (Kid) Howard of Halifax retained his Canadian lightweight boxing title Saturday night when he pointed out a 12-round decision over Jackie Hayden of nearby Westville. It was Howard's second victory in his last six starts.

The Halifax boxer had to sweat off nearly four pounds Saturday to get down to the required 135-pound weight limit. He entered the ring at 134 and took command of the scrap after the third round. Hayden, who entered the ring at 133 pounds, was bothered by a cut over the left eye which was opened in the fifth round.

All three judges voted for Howard. Judge Gus MacLellan of Sydney scored it 7-3-2; Judge Harry Paulson of Charlottetown favored Howard 5-4-3, and Judge Chris Shaban of Moncton scored it 6-3-3.

In preliminary bouts, Tiger Steele, 140, of Charlottetown, won a split decision over Doug Odo, 137, Thorburn N.S., while Allan McKay 143½, of Stellarton won by unanimous decision over Len Sparks, 142, of Halifax.

Toronto Maple Leafs Crush Boston Bruins 7-0 On Sat.

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs, winless in their first three games, hit high gear with a vengeance Saturday night to crush Boston Bruins 7-0 before 13,109 National Hockey League fans. It ended Boston's winning streak at four games.

Two of Leafs' most promising youngsters, 23-year-old Brian Cullen and 22-year-old Billy Harris, led the rout with three goals apiece. The defensive job was handled by goaltender Ed Chadwick, who made some spectacular saves on the 30 Bruin shots.

Penalty-killer Ron Stewart, who also takes a regular turn on offense, scored the other goal, streaking for Boston territory on a breakaway from his own end in the second period to beat goaltender Don Simmons cleanly.

INCREDIBLE TURNABOUT
It was an incredible turnabout for Leafs. They had managed only six goals in their previous three engagements this season.

They were sadly disorganized during much of the first period Saturday, then sent the customers wild with the scoring outburst.

Although Cullen and Harris took most of the glory, it was Chadwick who provided the defensive strength when Leafs were at their worst. He held off the Bruins in the dying moments with several great saves.

Although Simmons, who had allowed only five goals before Saturday's game, had a rough night he had little chance on the shots that went past him. He stopped 21 Leaf drives, 12 in the third period. Leafs had only three shots on him in the opening period.

Referee Eddie Powers called nine penalties to each team, including two majors. George Armstrong of the Leafs and Bionda were sent off with majors for fighting in the third period.

Haney Signs A Contract

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Fred Haney, manager of the world champion Milwaukee Braves, Saturday signed a new one-year contract that will pay him an estimated \$40,000.

Haney said the 1958 salary in the highest he's received in 34 years in baseball.

General Manager John Quins said: "Fred has done a tremendous job. He's a great hustler and a fellow with a lot of determination, and he instilled the ball club with those qualities."

The 50-year-old Los Angeles resident is given the inside track on being named the National League manager of the year.

Haney guided the Braves to world series victory in his first full year as their manager. He replaced Charlie Grimm as field boss in June of 1956.

The one-year contract is in keeping with a club policy. His salary for 1957 was estimated at between \$25,000 and \$30,000.

U. S. Streamlines Missile Work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defence Secretary Neil McElroy Friday took personal command of the United States ballistic missile programs. He ordered the military departments Friday to give him weekly progress reports.

McElroy, who has been defence secretary for only 10 days, made known his decision in a memorandum addressed to the secretaries of the army, navy and the air force.

McElroy said his preliminary study of the missile program revealed no regulations to hamper progress in developing ballistic weapons. But he said "it is apparent" that "we should give continuing attention to the removal or modification of any regulations which could conceivably impede progress."

The 22-year-old duke and fellow lieutenants of the Royal Scots Greys pelled each other with the messy missiles during a send off for a tank regiment going to Germany.

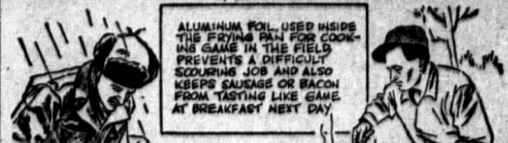
As the troop train pulled out, the duke led a bombardment by the stay-at-home. Departing officers replied in kind.
