Six buildings on Waterloo and Petu Streets, St. John, were destroyed by fire on Friday last.

The steamer "Miramichi" arrived from Montreal this forenoon with a large cargo of merchandise.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon a sailor named E. Flanagan was sentenced to six months imprisonment for vagrancy.

A dog belonging to Mr. Donald McIsaac having bit a little daughter of Mr. Henry Wadman, was ordered by the Stipendiary Magistrate to be immediately destroyed or sent out of the city.

The brig "Perseus," Capt. Fredk. Douse, from Liverpool, O. E., for P. E. Island, 50 days at sea, put back to Waterford, Ireland, on the 3rd inst., to repair damages sustained during the recent gales.

The St. John Telegraph says: "It is reported, apparently on good authority, that the St. Lawrence Sugar Refinery of Montreal will remove to a Maritime port." No doubt, the advantages presented to manufacturing industry by Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will, ere long, be apparent to all.

OUT of the last gang of 28 men who went from Halifax to Mexico to work in the silver mines, seven of them ran away before reaching there—a loss to the company of nearly \$1,000 paid for their expenses. They ran away after signing an agreement to work in the mines for a year.

A PRIVATE TELEGRAM has been received at Ottawa stating that the American, Canadian, European & Asiatic Cable Co., which was chartered last session, has completed its organization. The Board of Directors is one of the strongest in capital and influence ever formed. The capital has been all subscribed and operations will be commenced at once. The company intends laying two cables next year and will, during the coming winter, make arrangements for the construction of land lines from Halifax to Victoria, connecting with all the principal cities of the Dominion.

LAMBS.—There is a good demand for Canada lambs in the American markets, and large quantities have recently been shipped from Ontario markets to the principal markets in the Eastern States. During the past week there has also been an enquiry in Quebec, and lambs have been bought there for shipment south of the line. On the New York market on Monday last a lot of Canadian lambs sold at 7c per lb., which was the top price of the day. Among other sales at good prices on the same market were those of 1,892 Canadian lambs at 6c to 6 1/2c per lb., and 1,098 do at \$5.62 1/2 to \$5.70 per 100 lbs. The weights of the above ranged from 70 to 82 lbs. per head. Some of the lambs recently purchased on this market for American account were only the ordinary qualities.—Gazette.

Personal.

The Governor-General sailed for England on Saturday.

A MAN servant of C. J. Tresdale, the enquiry to the Prince of Wales, killed himself at Aberfeldie, in Scotland, the other day. He was sober and temperate in his habits, but had been in a melancholy mood for a couple of days, and cut his throat the day he was to have accompanied his master as enquiry to the Prince on his visit to Lord Fife at Mar Lodge. The day was the anniversary of the suicide of Lord Fife's own valet, who destroyed himself during the Prince and Princess of Wales' visit to Mar Lodge.

During his travel through the prairie, the Governor-General met a man named John McHugh, who formerly resided in Gloucester, a short distance from the city. His Excellency found McHugh quite an amusing character, and before leaving, asked if he had any messages to send to his parents. The man replied that he had nothing particular to say, but if His Excellency happened to meet either his father or mother, he would feel obliged if he mentioned that he was in good spirits and doing well. A day or two ago His Excellency drove out to Felix McHugh's place and executed the commission. The old couple were in ecstasies.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

IRISH NEWS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4

In reply to an invitation from the officers of the Land League to visit Ireland and advocate their cause as representatives of America, Wendell Phillips has written a letter of declination on account of his health, but expressing warm encouragement. He says: "We have a right to infer, from England's insolence and brutality, in word and act, that she seeks to provoke Ireland to violence, and thus get an excuse for military occupation of the island. It is infinitely important that Ireland should be awake to this plot, and by serene forbearance defeat it. At the same time, it is really important, for the sake of civil liberty in Ireland, with a united front, and courage never to submit or yield, should defend the citadel of personal freedom and civilization. Success is sure. To doubt it were to doubt the world's progress and the rule of a just God."

LONDON, Nov. 4.

A correspondent of the Daily News at Armagh, discussing the working of the Land Act, says as soon as a few decisions have been given, and as soon as the tendency of the decisions begins to be grasped by landlord and tenant, an amicable arrangement will take place in an overwhelming proportion of cases.

BELFAST, Nov. 5.

The sub-commission of the Land Court has given judgment in the cases of fifteen tenants on the estate of Archdeacon Crawford, in all, except one case, reducing the rents.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.

President Arthur has decided to designate Thursday, the 24th November, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4.

The resignation of John W. Foster, U. S. Minister to Russia, was received and accepted to-day.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 4.

The British Minister, Mr. West, arrived to-day and was given the hospitalities of the city. Mr. West replied, hoping that the present good feeling between the United States and Great Britain heretofore prevailing might be lasting, and assured the listeners that he would do all in his power to promote that end.

At a banquet to night Secretary Blaine, whose health was drunk standing, paid an eloquent tribute to the Queen, saying, in loyalty to that lady, and admiration for that Gracious Sovereign, the feelings of this people were not to be undone by the people of England. In closing he offered the toast "The Queen," which was also drunk standing. In response the Minister spoke briefly.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 4.

The steamer Lake Winnipeg, from Montreal, arrived to-day. She lost fifty head of cattle and 200 sheep during the passage and had a heavy list.
