Montreal Gazette: Mr. Laurier is showing a good deal of political independence these days. He retorts with the Government and against his colleagues on two of the most important questions brought up in the latter days of the session, the French treaty and the drawback on steel and iron railway bridges.

The London Times reminds the public in connection with what was said and done at the Intercolonial conference, that just at present, with the United Kingdom so much more populous and having so much greater interests than the colonies, the commercial conditions that are best for her must be best for the greatest number in the Empire, and so best for the Empire.

The authorities at Chicago are proceeding with vigor against the leaders in the railway strike, and the chances appear to favor the idea that, in the case of some of the accused, the indictment will be followed by a trial.

A bill has been introduced in Congress by Mr. McKeljohn, of Nebraska, the object of which is to restrict immigration into the United States. It provides that there shall be collected a duty of \$100 for every alien immigrant, and paid into the United States treasury.

BRITISH UNITY VS. ANNEXATION.

Montreal Gazette: The world has not known and does not know another such empire as that of Great Britain. There is nothing that man needs for comfort and luxury that is not produced within its limits. Its rulers control the political destinies of three hundred and fifty millions of people, scattered over the four quarters of the globe, but united by the tie of common loyalty to the mother land.

Montreal Star: As a people, we feel no temptation to leave the Imperial circle in order to link our fortunes with those of the Republic. The question is not why should we? Surely the delegates have found us a rational community, not likely to throw away a good thing in order to grasp something of little value and less substantial. If that be so, let them reflect on what we would lose with the severance of British connection, and what we would gain with Annexation.

There is a wide question—does duty or the permanence of present arrangements. Already Congress is engaged in reducing somewhat the rigors of McKinleyism; and, as the people of the United States more and more understand that the tariff against us is an oppressive tax upon themselves, the tariff against the goods that we would naturally sell to the Americans will disappear.

CONDENNED BY MGR. SATOLLI.

An Important Ruling Regarding the Liquor Traffic. As was announced by THE EXAMINER on Friday, Mgr. Satolli, the Apostolic Delegate, has recently rendered a decision which presents a strong and unequivocal condemnation of the liquor traffic, especially as it is carried on in the United States, and approves of the expulsion of liquor dealers from the Catholic societies.

The remarkable decision was called forth by an appeal from the ruling of the Rev. John A. Watterson, D. D., Bishop of Columbus, O., made by one of the societies in his jurisdiction. During the last Lent season, Bishop Watterson, who is one of the most ardent temperance reformers of the Roman Catholic Church, addressed a letter to the clergy of his diocese, to be read before their several congregations. This letter dealt wholly with the liquor problem, and in the course of this pastoral communication Bishop Watterson said:

"I hereby withdraw my approbation from any and every Catholic society or branch or division of the same, which has a liquor dealer or saloon keeper at its head or anywhere among its officers, and I suspend every such society itself from the rank and privileges of a Catholic society until it ceases to be so officered. I again publish the condition, without which for some time I have declined to approve of new societies or new branches of old organizations in this diocese—namely, that no one who is engaged either as principal or agent in the manufacture or sale of intoxicating liquors can be admitted to membership."

"If there are saloon keepers in your parish who call themselves Catholics and yet carry on their business in a forbidden and discreditable way, or sell on Sunday, either openly or under any disguise or disguise, in violation of civil law, and to the hurt and order of religion and the scandal of any part of the community, you will refer them to the proper authorities for their punishment, should they perchance come to receive the sacraments, unless they promise to cease offending in these or other ways and to conduct their business blamelessly, if they can, or get out of it and keep out of it altogether."

To many of the societies of Columbus this attitude of Bishop Watterson seemed arrogant and unjust, and one of the societies there laid the matter formally before Mgr. Satolli. After a time the apostolic delegate returned an answer, upholding the position of the bishop. But still the society was not satisfied, and it was said that the delegate did not understand the case, or he surely would not sustain a ruling which they believed was in direct opposition to personal liberty.
