Powerful Figure In U.K. Gov't Resigns In Protest

LONDON (Reuters)—The Marquess of Salisbury, one of the most powerful and influential figures in the Conservative party, resigned today as a cabinet minister in protest against the government's action in releasing Archbishop Makarios from exile.

Lord Salisbury was lord president of the council—a non-departmental portfolio in the inner ranks of the government.

He was the first statesman called by the Queen to advise her on the choice of a prime minister in succession to Sir Anthony Eden.

The present head of the noble house of Cecil, which has played a dominating part in British politics for centuries, Lord Salisbury had occupied high office in the successive governments of Sir Winston Churchill, Sir Anthony Eden and Harold Macmillan, the present prime minister.

In his letter of resignation to Macmillan, Lord Salisbury—whose resignation came as a bombshell to political quarters—said he could not be a party to recommending to parliament a course he believed to be neither wise nor timely.

He said the government's step would have been "fully justified" had the archbishop fulfilled what had hitherto been regarded as the essential prerequisite for his release—an unconditional appeal to EOKA, the Cyprus terrorist organization, to call a halt to its campaign of terrorism.

But the archbishop had "deliberately refrained" from doing that and had on the contrary "imposed a condition so far-reaching that the government have had to state quite frankly that they cannot do what he asks."
