

Golf Tourney Dates Announced At Meet

FREDERICTON (CP) — The annual New Brunswick Prince Edward Island amateur golf championships will be played at the Riverside Golf and Country Club July 16, 17 and 18.

Dates for the tournament were set here Sunday at the spring meeting of the board of governors of the N.B.-P.E.I. Association.

The N.B.-P.E.I. junior championships, a two-day, 34-hole tournament, will be played at the Fredericton golf club July 21 and 22.

Dates and courses also were selected for the Willington Cup trials which will be held prior to the July 16-18 tournament. Two members of the team which will represent the two provinces in an interprovincial play at London, Ont., in August, will be selected during the trials. The other two members of the four-man team will be named following the annual tournament.

Plans also were advanced for the Canadian junior championships and the interprovincial junior team matches to be played at the Moncton Golf and Country Club Aug. 28 to 31. It was announced that the Royal Canadian Golf Association had set handicap requirements for the Canadian Junior at 15 or less.

The N.B.-P.E.I. governors decided that arrangements would be made for the N.B.-P.E.I. team to arrive at the site of the tournament by Thursday night at the latest in order to have Friday, Saturday and Sunday for practice rounds.

July 28 and 29 — N.B.-P.E.I. junior tournament at the Fredericton Golf and Country Club.

Oregon U. Shatters Mark In West Coast Relays Sat.

FRESNO, Calif. (CP - AP) — Doyal Burleson, North America's fastest miler, raced the anchor lap in three minutes, 37.9 seconds Saturday as the University of Oregon team shattered the world record in the four-mile relay with a time of 6:08.9 at the West Coast relays. A Canadian miler, Vic Reeve of Vancouver, ran the second leg.

That bettered by almost 15 seconds the record set last year by a New Zealand national team at 16:22.

Another member of the Oregon team, Canadian Olympian Harry Jerome of Vancouver, took the 100-yard dash in 9.3 seconds, but with an aiding wind of 4.9 miles an hour, far above allowable limit of 4.73 for record consideration.

The wind whipped up in the evening races after the world four-mile relay record was cracked.

Jerome, a native of Prince Albert, Sask., and the son of a railway porter, is attending Oregon on a scholarship. He is the co-holder of the world 100-meter dash record of 16 seconds that with Armin Harry of East Germany, the Olympic 100-meter champion.

Burleson, holder of the U.S. mile record at 3:37.6, also anchored the Oregon team last year.

Usually the calmest man in a race, Burleson said he ran his first lap in 37 seconds, "because I was excited."

Snell, the world record holder at 3:54.4.

"He's the world champion and I don't have anything to lose. I don't know how fast I can run this year, but I think it's considerably faster than today."

Burleson's official lap times, with the running relay start, were 37 seconds, 40.1, 42.1 and 45.5.

The meeting, between the world's only two 16-foot pole vaulters, John Uelses and Dave Turk, failed to live up to expectation as neither could clear 15-8 after going over 15', the same as three other vaulters.

Jack Herman, former University of California collegian, cracked another meet record as

he ran the 440 in 68.6, 1-10th second faster than the 68.7 record shared here by Mal Whitefield and Kevin Hogan.
