No Immediate Plans For Royal Visit To America

LONDON Reuters — Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh have no immediate plans to visit the United States and Canada, it was officially stated here today. The statement came from a foreign office spokesman who was commenting on a Washington report that President Eisenhower had invited the Queen to visit the United States this autumn.

"We understand that Buckingham Palace has said that this is by no means the first time that the possibility of a visit by the Queen to the United States has been mooted," the spokesman said. "In fact, however, there are no plans for a royal visit to the United States or to Canada at present."

Authoritative sources in Washington said Sunday the Queen had "unofficially" accepted the American invitation.

They added a formal announcement was being delayed at the suggestion of the British government until Anglo-American relations, upset by the Suez crisis, were on a firmer footing.

These sources said President Eisenhower sent the invitation to London several weeks ago. They forecast acceptance after the Bermuda meeting next month between President Eisenhower and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan.

Before the foreign office comment, The News Chronicle described the reported invitation as a generous gesture toward the British people.
