Egg Production Holding Steady

The production of eggs in Prince Edward Island is holding steady reports Mr. F. M. Nash, district inspector of poultry products. Quality is only fair contributed to skimpy feeding or excessive range. The demand for the product continues strong and prices have strengthened. Operators of grading stations are quoting for ungraded eggs AL 35-36, AM 32-34, AS and B 20, C 16. Dealers are quoting operators of stations for graded pack AL 41-43, AM 39-41, AS and B 26, C 20. Eggs are retailing to customers at AL 47-49, AM 45-47, AS and B 40.

The poultry market is quiet. Receipts are very light and price quotations are unchanged.

There is little change in the hatchery situation. Over the counter sales are now heavier. Hatchability continues very good with following flock owners having over 80% hatchability during past week: W. J. Andrew, Crossbreds, 80%; Lloyd Burns, N.H. 80%; Boswell Carver, Crossbreds, 81%; Clair Croken, Crossbreds, 80%; Melvin Hyde, Crossbreds, 80%; B. B. Jones, Crossbreds, 80%; Walter A. Mullen, Crossbreds, 85%; Mrs. Stanley Prude, Crossbreds, 92%; Ralph Raynor, Crossbreds, 90%; White Leghorns, 91%; Albert Stetson, Crossbreds, 87%; Mrs. I. Tweedy, N.H. 81%; Elmer Waugh, Crossbreds, 81%; Mrs. Henry Waugh, Sr., Crossbreds, 80%.
