

# Business Held As Pattern For Governments To Follow

LONDON (CP) — Canadian trade Minister Robert Winters said here federal and provincial governments in Canada should take a lesson from private business and learn to spend within their means.

He also stressed the benefits of foreign ownership and investment in Canadian industry. Winters, who headed Canadian operations of the vast British-based Rio Tinto organization and other companies before he joined the Pearson government last year, reviewed Canadian business and the economy in an address to the British Institute of Management.

Referring to current deflationary measures in Canada, which now include a year's delay in the federal medical care program, Winters said:

"Canadian governments at all levels have been spending too much money—not in relation to the needs for services of all kinds, for we all recognize that there is much more that must be done—but in the light of what we can currently afford."

"Governments can benefit by the example of responsible private enterprise — which takes pride in keeping shareholders informed and which recognizes that if its expenditures exceed its revenues for very long it is bound to fail."

Winters, on a three-week trade-promotion tour of Eastern Europe, has visited Poland and Czechoslovakia and leaves today for Yugoslavia, Bulgaria and Hungary.

## Canadian Fear Of Absorption Held Invalid

OTTAWA — (CP) — Although many Canadians fear economic absorption by the United States, these fears are probably invalid, a Montreal industrialist maintains.

"If economic inter-dependence makes sense and is soundly developed, it will strengthen political independence rather than weaken it," says Robert M. Fowler, president of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association.

"If Canadians can achieve a standard of living closer to that of the United States we will with increased economic strength be better able to use our political sovereignty to develop political and social policies in the directions we, or our descendants, want to follow."

In a paper prepared for presentation to next month's national Liberal party policy conference here, Mr. Fowler says future Canadians may want Canada to become part of the United States.

"The choice of our political goals is for each generation to make. Our children or grandchildren may want to unite with the United States; we have no right to foreclose that choice."

"Our duty is to hand on to the strongest economy we can construct and, with the strength it gives, leave them to make their political choices."

## Yank Thinks Scotland Yard Might Probe Kennedy Death

LONDON (Reuters) — American lawyer Mark Lane has called here for a new investigation into U.S. President Kennedy's assassination. Suggesting Britain's Scotland Yard could possibly do the job.

Lane was speaking on the eve of publication in Britain of his book *Rush to Judgment*, which rejects the official Warren commission view that Lee Harvey Oswald — later shot to death by Jack Ruby — was the sole assassin.

Lane showed newspaper men filmed interviews with three railway workers who said they witnessed the assassination during Kennedy's cavalcade through Dallas Nov. 22, 1963.

All spoke of seeing shots fired from behind a wooden fence on top of a knoll to the front and right of the president's car.

The commission headed by U.S. Chief Justice Earl Warren concluded in its report that all the shots which hit the president and Governor John Connally of Texas were fired from a high window of a Dallas book depot — behind the car.

In the filmed and taped interviews, the railway men spoke of seeing puffs of smoke and flashes of light from behind the fences.

Lane said the railway men's evidence had been ignored by the Warren commission.

The lawyer demanded that all evidence on the shooting — some of which had been placed in the national archives in Washington as classified material not to be opened for the next 70 years — should be made available and a new inquiry opened.

"There are suggestions that the inquiry should be made by an outside agency — such as Scotland Yard," Lane said. That is worth considering."

## Electric Cars Scheduled For British Staff

LONDON (CP) — Britain's state electricity authority plans to introduce electric-powered automobiles for its staff and service personnel within 18 months, a spokesman said here.

The announcement by Kenneth Jeremy, project engineer for the Electricity Council, said the council has been experimenting with prototypes, including a four-seater, a two-seater and an electrically-operated tricycle and bicycle. The version expected to be used experimentally by council staff at first is based on a runabout called the Scamp made by Scottish Aviation Ltd.

Should the council's so-called electric prove practicable, plastic-bodied commercial versions would be manufactured under contract for general sale — possibly through the council's retail showrooms along with stoves, refrigerators and other electric appliances.

**POWERED BY BATTERIES**

Powered by lead-acid batteries, the four-seater version would have a top speed of 40 miles an hour and a range of about 50 miles before the batteries would need recharging by plugging in to the domestic electricity supply.

The vehicle is planned primarily as a runabout for city use. The advantages of electric power are said to be lack of noise, absence of exhaust, and

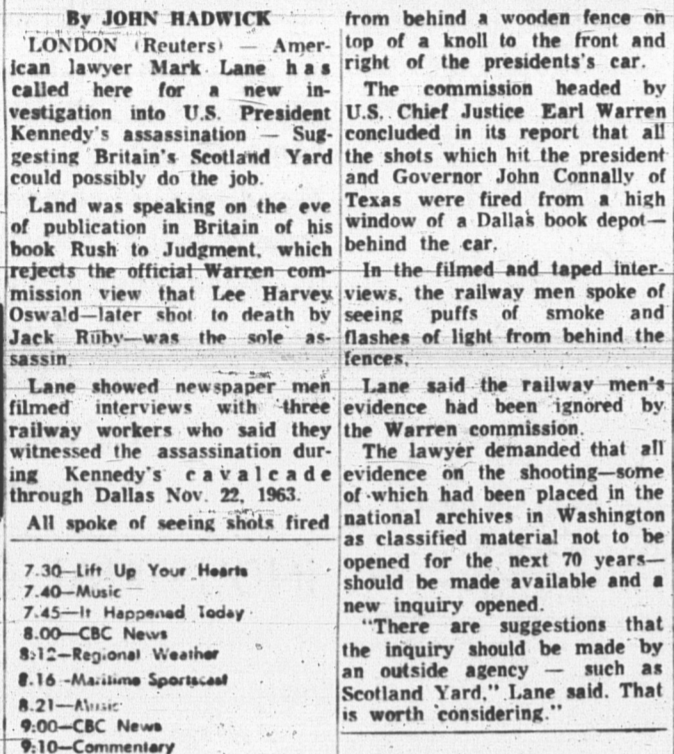

## CONTRACT BRIDGE

**TEST YOUR PLAY**

1. You are declarer with the West hand at Six Hearts and North leads the three of hearts. South plays the queen which you win with the king. North follows with the ace. North follows with the nine of hearts. South playing a club. How would you now play the hand?

2. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump. North leads the six of spades and you win the queen with the ace. How would you now play the hand?

1. Perhaps the most natural thing to do would be to lead three rounds of clubs, discarding a spade, and then three rounds of diamonds, discarding the king of spades. This line of play would make the contract provided North had as many as three clubs and two diamonds.

However, this would not be the proper way to play the hand. The fact is that the hand cannot be made unless North has at least two diamonds, and diamonds should therefore be led first to see how you stand.
