THE steamer Coban, Capt. Fraser, arrived from Montreal this forenoon with a cargo of merchandise, en route to St. John's, Nfld. She will take a quantity of produce at this port, and proceed to St. John's to-morrow at noon.

DIPHTHERIA is prevalent in Quebec. A number of cases are reported in one family, recently arrived from Labrador. Two deaths have occurred, while in St. Roches all the children of two brothers, living in adjacent houses, have succumbed to the malady.

THE case of Downie vs Steamer Worcester, is now before the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia. The case arises out of a collision in Halifax harbor a few months ago, when the steamer was proceeding to Boston, the schooner being also bound out.

S. S. PAT KSON, Esq., of the Registry Office, returned a few days ago from the Southern States. We are indebted to his kindness for specimens of the rice plant and the cotton plant—both beautiful and interesting as well as valuable products of the sunny climate.

COURT CASES.—We are authorized to announce that by order of the Judge of the County Court of King's County, the next sitting of the County Court, at Souris, will be adjourned on Tuesday next until Tuesday, 5th January, and the next sitting of the Court at St. Peter's Bay will be adjourned on next Tuesday week until Tuesday, the 12th day of January.

TRADE at Charlottetown Bridge has been very active this week. Five large schooners, carrying an average of over 6000 bushels each, have been loading with potatoes, and farmers from the surrounding country, some of them coming as far as twelve miles, have been busy hauling their produce. Oats command 32 cents, McIntyre potatoes 17 cents, Rosas and Barback potatoes 19 cents.

MELANCHOLY ACCIDENT.—Mr. Matthew Murphy, a well known resident of China Point, father of Mr. Murphy, of the Post Office, and respected by all who knew him, came to his death in a sad manner yesterday. While leading his horse, with a punchon of water on a truck, the water splashed and frightened the horse, throwing Mr. Murphy down, when the wheel passed over his body. He died in about fifteen minutes after.

FIRE.—At Orwell Cove, on the night of the 26th inst., the barn belonging to Mr. Alex. McDonald (Shook) was burned to the ground. It contained all his hay and straw. The fire is attributed to some boys lurking around and striking matches outside the barn where there was loose straw. If parties were as frightened about fire as they are about smallpox, insurance companies would have less to pay.

After all allowances are made, there appears to remain ample ground for congratulating Mr. Culp and those associated with him, on their good luck in striking a bonanza. It is asserted on authority that over two hundred dollars worth of gold was, with the simplest methods taken out of it, lead one day last week.—Liverpool Advertiser.

The liquidators of Peters' combination lock company and directors of the new brass and iron manufacturing company, met at Moncton on the 25th inst., and agreed upon the basis for the transfer of the property to be sanctioned by Judge King. The liquidators agreed to sell the property to the new company for \$45,000, except the amount of the stock of the new company already paid in, some \$35,000, and give immediate possession, waiting a short time for final adjustment. In the meantime, stockholders in the new company who are half paid stockholders in the old company, and therefore liable to the liquidators, will be given a double receipt, which will amply secure them in case of failure to complete arrangements. Failure is not, however, anticipated, and it is hoped this extensive factory will in a short time be in operation again.

Bishop Cameron on Riel.

OTTAWA, Nov. 28.

Bishop Cameron, of Antigonish, is the guest of the Minister of Justice. From a reported statement of his in the Montreal Gazette, it appears that his Loyalism is strongly opposed to the agitation over Riel. He said: 'Looking at it from a common-sense point of view, the thing appears to have no bottom to it. An agitation because of the execution of Riel is without foundation and has no raison d'etre.' He said further he was satisfied the agitation would die a natural death.

Death of King Alfonso.

MADRID, Nov. 27.

A state of siege has been proclaimed in the province of Barcelona and Carthagena and the Canary Islands. Despatches from all points, however, report a tranquil state of affairs.

The Minister of War and Minister of the Interior have ordered the Provincial officials to use the utmost tact and discretion as long as order prevails, and take immediate and energetic action the moment the slightest indication of disorder appears, and to proclaim a state of siege when necessary.

The editors of the Journal la Discussion have been arrested for publishing the headline: 'Alfonso is dead; long live the Republic.'

Execution of Rebels.

BATTLEFORD, Nov. 27.

The execution of eight Indians, found guilty of murder at Frog Lake and Battleford, took place this morning. The gallows worked without friction. The victims of the Frog Lake massacre were Quinn, the Indian agent, Guion, half-breed, Delaney, Farm Instructor Gowanlock, Miller, Fathers Chiffar and Marchand, and Dell, Willis, Craft and Gillebrist.

The British Elections.

LONDON, Nov. 27.

The latest returns show 131 Liberals, 124 Tories and 81 Parnellites elected thus far. The Tory net gain 26.

In Midlothian, Gladstone received 7,874 votes to 3,245 for Dalagrype.

Another Murderer Hanged.

TORONTO, Nov. 27.

Bery Simmons, who murdered his parour, Mary Ann Stokes, in June last, was hanged at London this morning in the presence of about one hundred people.

The Servian War.

LONDON, Nov. 27.

The Times Constantinople despatch says that Servia and Bulgaria have agreed to an armistice on the mediation of Turkey, Austria and Russia.

MIDNIGHT DESPATCHES.

The steamship Emma Graham, sunk in the Opea River last night by a collision with a barge. One man drowned and several missing.

At Pittsburg, Pa., yesterday, 100 striking miners were arrested for creating disturbances.

An election riot took place at London-derry yesterday, during which the windows of Protestants were broken, and the Salvation Army barracks wrecked.

The British expeditionary force reached Nyeenyau on the 25th, and proceeded same evening to Mandalay.

Evertton Division—E. Whitley, Conservative.

Derby, West Division—Hamilton.
Durham—The Tory candidate defeated T. C. Thompson, Parnell's protege.
Northampton—H. Labouchere and C. Bradlaugh, Liberals.

South Paddington—Lord R. Churchill defeated Skinner, 2,631 to 1,025.
Reading—Murdoch defeated Lefevre, Liberal, by 3,818 to 3,359.

Deptford—The Tory candidate defeated the Liberal candidate, who was a native of India.
West Leeds—Herbert Gladstone, Liberal.
Derby—Sir W. V. Harcourt and T. Roe, Liberals.

Fulham—W. Hays Fisher, Conservative, defeated Rush.
Shoreditch, Hoggersten Division—W. R. Crower, labor.
West Bristol—Sir M. H. Beach, Conservative.

Central Hackney—Sir Guyer Hunter, Conservative, defeated John Holmes, Liberal.

The Tory newspapers to-day say that so far the Tory reaction exceeds the Liberal reaction of 1880.

The Parliamentary candidates elected in the city of London are R. N. Fowler, Conservative, 12,825 votes, over Hibbard, 8,892; S. P. Low, Liberal, 5,817 votes, over W. J. R. Cotton, Conservative, 5,563.

Lambeth, Kennington Division—R. Gen. Davis, Conservative, 3,351 votes, over J. O'Connor Power, Liberal, 2,991.
Mayo—Mr. Crilly, unopposed.
Kerry—Mr. Crilly, unopposed.

The Liberals gained in Salisbury.
The totals thus far are as follows: Liberals, 91; Conservatives, 90; Nationalists, 6. Liberal gain, 6; Tory gain, 27.

The Tory reaction is still unchecked, and the enthusiasm of the Conservatives is unbounded and contagious. Great crowds gather in the neighborhood of the bulletin boards and their announcements of a sweeping Tory success. The Conservatives have carried five of six Manchester divisions. He sugar operatives of East St. George's returned Mr. Ritchie, an advocate of counterbalancing duties. In Hampstead, Sir H. Holland, Conservative, who received 2,789 votes, defeated the Marquis of Lorne. The Liberals also received 1,810.

LONDON, Nov. 27.—1 a. m.

The returns up to 1 o'clock this morning, show that 109 Liberals, 108 Tories and 10 Parnellites have been elected. The Liberal gains so far are six seats, and Tory gains 29 seats.
