CRISIS IN BRITISH TRADE
 England on the Eve of Period of Depression.

Predictions are now freely made that England is on the eve of a great trade depression as a natural consequence of the increased cost of living. Richard Bell, M. P., in an interview says:

"Already the wageworker is feeling the pinch of the augmented price of necessities. Twenty-three shillings now buys only what 20 shillings did two years ago."

"Moreover, the working classes, especially the railway servants, are seething with discontent, and the agitation for increased wages is proceeding rapidly, and strikes are threatened because the advance in the cost of living is tantamount to a reduction in wages. I am afraid we have a big fight before us, as the number of the unemployed will be largely augmented."

Lord Avebury, head of the banking house of Roberts, Lubbock & Co., one of the greatest of English financiers, says there is sure to be a swing of the pendulum after the prosperous times of the last twenty years. He ascribes the increased cost of living to the greatly augmented output of gold and the fact that the Transvaal war withdrew from the country thousands of men otherwise engaged in productive labor.
