PLASTER IS ANCIENT AS ROOM COVERING

Plaster for building purposes has been used for centuries and still covers 80 per cent of home interiors. Its insulating and sanitary properties were developed by the ancients and its decorative possibilities furthered by the Greeks and Romans. King John of England recognized its fire-resistant qualities after the great London fire. Sanitary laws in many States require all habitable rooms to be lathed and plastered. It insulates against cold and drafts as well as heat. Taking 1 per cent to 4 per cent of total building cost, there is no cheap substitute, as other materials give much less in service for the comparative outlay.

BEAVER SKINS FOR ROYALTY

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 17—Two black beaver skins for His Majesty King George VI out flowers and canned salmon from British Columbia for other recipients and a packet of parasites addressed to Tel Aviv, Palestine, to fight the citrus mealy bug, will be in the Imperial Airways Flying Boat Cabot when it takes off from Boucherville for its return flight overseas Thursday morning.
