TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. DOMINION PARLIAMENT. HOUSE OF COMMONS. Lively Opposition Members. THE BUDGET DEBATE. OTTAWA, July 15. The House of Commons yesterday was occupied in committee on the Thunder Bay Railway Act. There was a very lively time between Ananias Cameron, McMullen and Casey, all Opposition members; the two first charging Casey with supporting the bill because he was a share-holder in the road, and declaring that he was opposing the wishes of his constituents. The bill passed unanimously. The debate on the Budget was then resumed by Mr. Josiah Wood, who spoke for three hours, till the adjournment. He made an able speech. The senate proposed adjournment for three weeks, and the session will probably last two months longer. THE TARTE-McGREGGIE CASE. Another Clerk Suspended. OTTAWA, July 15. In the Tarte-McGreggie case, yesterday, the committee decided to obtain the assistance and evidence of expert engineers as to the value of the alteration in the contracts. Simon Gelders, an unsuccessful tenderer, gave important testimony as to the value of work done. Owen Murphy said that the name of the Railway Department clerk, to whom he gave a hundred dollars, four years ago, was Lightfoot. He has been suspended. Heavy Thunder Storms. OTTAWA, July 15. There were two severe thunder storms, with torrents of rain, here yesterday. A dwelling house was shattered, and windows were broken in the Parliament building, but no one was hurt. Further Irregularities—More Suspensions. OTTAWA, July 15. Investigation into the Department of the Interior disclosed further irregularities, resulting in the suspension of more clerks. Irish Land Bill. LONDON, July 15. The Irish Land Bill passed its third reading in the House of Lords without division. Fishery Bulletin. (Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, July 16.—Codfish are reported very plentiful off English Bay, Anticosti; at River John, Hunter River, Moig River, Magpie River, Seven Islands and Sheldrake, Que., fair; at Long Point and Paspébiac fair catches are being made. At Point Escummiac, N. B., Margaree, and Arichat, C. B., White Head and Digby, N. S., fishermen report good fishing at North Bay and Port Medway, N. S., but at the latter place very little bait is obtainable and dogfish are beginning to be troublesome. Trawlers are doing well in the cod and haddock fisheries at Campbell's, N. B.; line fishermen fairly. The hake and haddock fisheries are reported very good at Digby, N. S.; haddock fair at Whitehead; Herring are reported very plentiful at English Bay, Anticosti. A few are being taken along the Cape Breton coast from Mabou to Ingonish Bay, and fair hauls in nets at Arichat, St. Peter's and Port Hawkesbury mackerel fair at Malpeque, P. E. I., St. Peters, and Port Hawkesbury, C. B. Lauce very good at Magpie and Seven Islands, Que.; fair at Thunder River and Sheldrake. Herring bait by fishermen nets reported at Arichat, C. B., and Yarmouth, N. S. DIED. At Hope River, June 29th, after an illness of five weeks, of inflammation of the lungs and la grippe, William Kelly, 36 years of age.
