Whitby Wins Over Moscow

TORONTO (CP) — The Allan Cup champion Whitby Dynopos, breaking up opposition offensive play almost at will, drove its five first-period goals Friday night and then coasted to a 7-2 victory over the touring Moscow Soviet Stars.

The pattern through the first two periods was a far cry from the pre-game blizzards by sports writers and hockey players who saw the Russian team go through workouts at Maple Leaf Gardens.

More than 14,000 fans jammed the arena for the night's game.

The Dynopos, who will represent Canada in the world ice hockey championship next February, waltzed the Russians through a scoreless second period. They reported in two quick goals in the third to wind it up.

The Soviet team got both its goals before the two-minute mark of the first period.

Among the standout performers of the night was U.S.-born Carl Weitzel, Whitby's stand-in goalie who plays regularly with Hamilton Cubs of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A team.

Ti-Cats Have Seven Point Buige Going Into Game

 HAMILTON (CP) — Hamilton Tiger-Cats, closer to the Grey Cup game than any other time since 1952 when they last represented the city, resume the Big Four football final today against Montreal Alouettes with a seven-point cushion.

The Tiger-Cats rated the best defensive club in the league and a 17-0 winner in the first of the two-game total-points series last Saturday at Montreal, need only to protect that seven-point lead to end Montreal's three-year reign as Big Four champion and advance into the cup showdown against the West.

HAMILTON was the last team to win the cup of the East. They beat Winnipeg Blue Bombers 12-5 in 1952 before Edmonton Eskimos came along to beat Alouettes three straight years.

The odds-makers don't think Coach Jim Trimble's Tiger-Cats need the safeguard of their first-game margin. They have established themselves as 5½-point favorites to 6 to 1 to beat the Alouettes again despite the close struggle the Ti-cats had in the opener and the wide-open onslaught the Al's are expected to throw.
