A WORD TO THE ELECTORS.

Electors ought to look ahead a little before they vote. They can tell pretty well how this country will be governed if the Liberal-Conservatives gain the majority.

In that case they will not expect a perfect government. But they will certainly have a government on Canadian and British lines, a government tending towards closer union with the mother country, while carefully guarding and promoting the material interests of our own land.

The Liberal-Conservative party has definite aims, and it is solid under the leadership of a great and patriotic leader. But what would be the result of the triumph of the Laurier-McCarthy-Patron combination, in which Taste and Davies, Cartwright and Prefontaine, Charlton and McShane are leading spirits?

Let us suppose that the combination has been entered into upon patriotic motives, and that all are honorable men who will stand by their declared principles. McCarthy has declared war to the death against the French language and against religion in the schools.

It is possible for him, supposing him to be an honest man, to support a leader to whom the French language is very dear and who professes to prize religious education in the public schools. The Liberal candidates in Ontario are bound to oppose what they call the "coercion" of Manitoba, the Liberal candidates of Quebec are (of the Greenway Government stands by its declared principles) bound to secure for Manitoba a more stringent measure of coercion than the Remedial Bill.

Can these two wings of the Liberal party be harmonized in support of one administration force to take action in one direction or the other? It is impossible to see how they can, upon any hypothesis other than that either one or both are dishonest and hypocritical. Then, how can they possibly unite upon a definite trade policy, which they claim to be for "Free Trade as it is in England," "the elimination of protection," "a revenue tariff," "Preferential Trade," "Unrestricted Reciprocity" and "moderate industrial protection" according to the predominant opinion of the locality from which they come?

Men having such widely different views cannot possibly unite to any purpose in support of any administration. A government made up and supported by elements such as the Liberal candidates in the forthcoming election must of necessity be a government of confusion and disaster. Why has the Democratic party in the United States so signally failed? It is at its head what the Liberal party of Canada has not, viz., a strong man; but it is composed of men whose aims and ends are different upon the tariff question and upon the money question, and the result of their administration of affairs has been disastrous to the country.

A RARE OPPORTUNITY.

The electors of the eastern and southern parts of this Province are going to have a rare treat in the poll addresses to be given by the Hon. Senator Wood, of Westmorland, N. B. J. Wood will speak at Souris on Wednesday, the 17th, at Montague Bridge on the 18th, and at Murray River on the 19th. The meetings will in each case open at 7.30 p. m. It is expected that these meetings will also be addressed by the Hon. Mr. Ferguson, as well as by the Conservative candidates for the ridings in which each meeting is held.

Mr. Rufus Pope is the Liberal-Conservative candidate for Compton, Quebec. The Liberal candidate is not yet in the field.

Mail and Empire: Mr. Laurier's programme—the programme he has just issued, not the Valleyfield programme, or the Montreal programme—is folly and ruin. It proposes a distinct blow at urban industry; it is at war with the agriculturist; it takes away every trade defence; it offers us no new market.

If the intricacies of some Ontario Liberal papers show the feelings of the hearts behind them, there is a lurking fear in the Opposition and P. P. A. bosom that Manitoba will vote for their candidate on the 23rd of June. There are some really funny things in this campaign.

Word has been passed around by the agitators that every report of a public meeting must have in it somewhere the statement that "there were many Conservatives present who will vote for the Liberal candidate." This will help to keep up the spirits of the faltering ones until the 23rd of June is reached.

In one Ontario constituency the grim determination of their candidate the keeper of the provincial polls. In another constituency the provincial Liberal was nominated. In Albert County, New Brunswick, they tried to get a provincial officer holder in the field, but failed. The party must be kept up for men.

"I have been through Dundas, St. Peter Bay and Baldwin's," said a gentleman to THE EXAMINER to day, "and things look grand. The great majority of the people of these thriving settlements are in hearty sympathy with the Liberal-Conservative party, and may be relied upon to do their duty on election-day." From other sections of Kings County the news is equally cheering.

W. A. McDonald, the Conservative candidate in Brandon, writes to a friend in Toronto that Dalton McCarthy left but little impression on the electors of that constituency. He claims that the Liberal party overreached himself by his amazing bitter attacks on the Catholic Church. His utterances on the subject produced a reaction among the people who were hitherto favorable to him, and the current was turned in Mr. McDonald's favor.

The election contest in Winnipeg is growing warmer. A week ago the Tribune, Mr. Martin's organ, declared that his backers were offering two to one on his election, and couldn't get a cent even at that rate. They say the Norwester announced that its editors had a thousand dollars and would give a bonus of fifty dollars to the Hospital if the Martin men would cover it at this odds mentioned. No one has come forward to do so, and now the Norwester defies the Martin men to cover its thousand at even money.

MEETING AT MURRAY HARBOR

James Dalziel, Esq., was chairman of the meeting at Murray North on Friday evening. Alexander Martin Esq. was the first speaker. He was followed by Wm. Welsh, Dr. Robertson, James Clow and D. A. McKinnon.

Mr. Welsh spoke for over an hour, and gave his views on the trade question, the school question, and also the branch railways, saying that he had always advocated the interests of the Belait and Murray Harbor districts in parliament.

Mr. Clow then addressed the electors for a short time and gave some sharp and telling points against the various policies of the Liberal party. He advised the people to stand by the Liberal-Conservative party and its well known policy.

Mr. D. A. McKinnon, of Georgetown, then made a few remarks, which were replied to by Mr. Martin, and with a vote of thanks to the chairman the meeting closed at half past 12 o'clock.
