This is an answer to the "whining articles" we sometimes read. A few comments upon this gratifying and re-assuring statement are unavoidably crowded out.

Mr. Heard's Letter.

A LETTER from William Heard, Esq., appears on our first page. We are also in receipt of a letter from Malcolm McLeod, Esq., bearing upon the same case. The latter is not intended for publication; but we take the liberty of making a short quotation, which will be our answer to the charge of partiality to Mr. McLeod, preferred by Mr. Heard:—

"May I ask the reason of your inserting in your paper of this evening, a distorted account of a matter between Mr. Heard and myself—framed in every line with the evident design of representing my conduct as inexcusably discreditable? You have culled every strong expression used in a heated discussion with a man, who, behind my back, attempted to blacken my character, and put forth a version that skillfully represents your friend as the innocent victim of violence," etc., etc.

As we report the cases of the class who generally appear at the Police Court, we could not, in justice to that class, omit a notice of a case in which Mr. William Heard and Mr. Malcolm McLeod, Q.C., were concerned. Our reporter has received the strictest injunctions to make a perfectly fair and true report of every case, and he states positively that, in this case, he did so. The fact that Mr. Heard and Mr. McLeod each think that we have favored the other, strengthens our belief that our reporter's statement is pretty nearly correct. We have only to add that we shall carefully preserve Mr. McLeod's letter as a unique specimen of red-hot literature, and a testimony to the liberal views of a "leading member of the bar" respecting the freedom and independence of the Press.

CIVIC.

A meeting of the City Council was held last evening to consider "the leasing of Pownal Wharf" and "a temporary loan at a defined rate of interest." Present: His Worship Mayor Dawson, and the Recorder; Councillors Ings, Beer, Lawson, Davy, Horne, Smith, Blake, Koughan, Byrne and Morris.

It was moved by Councillor Koughan and seconded by Councillor Byrne,—

Resolved, That Pownal Wharf be leased at auction for the period of five years, subject to such conditions as may be adopted by the Council.

The sale was, on motion, ordered to take place on the 22nd inst., due notice of which will be given by advertisement in the EXAMINER Herald and Patriot.

The consideration of "a temporary loan at a defined rate of interest" did not develop into a long debate, as expected. Councillor Byrne led off with a number of inquiries regarding the recent financial transactions of the Corporation, while Councillors Davy and Horne were of opinion that a Finance Committee should be appointed before any financial question was discussed. They expressed high opinions of Councillors Ings, Blake and Beer, as financiers, and hoped they would reconsider their resignations as members of the Finance Committee.

Councillor Horne moved, and Councillor Davy seconded, that the Finance Committee have leave to withdraw their resignations. Carried almost unanimously.

Councillor Koughan was much surprised at the opinions expressed by Councillor Horne, and in moving the following resolution was prepared to stand or fall by it:—

Resolved, That all money collected by the city be paid into the Bank of Prince Edward Island.

Councillor Byrne seconded the resolution,

giving as his reasons, that the Union Bank was not any longer willing to place money at the disposal of the Council.

Councillor Horne considered the resolution untimely. Whatever good effect it would have later, it could have no good effect now, as no arrangements have yet been completed with the Banks.

Councillor Beer could not understand the meaning of such a resolution, as nothing definite had yet been obtained from the Union Bank. This bank had carried the corporation through thick and thin, and it would be uncourteous to treat them harshly now. It was time enough when the Bank refused to do anything for the Council to move a resolution like Councillor Koughan's.

Councillor Morris said the City had several good offers for money—some less than 7 per cent.

Councillor Smith was much surprised at the resolution. He protested against treating the Bank so uncourteously, and said it should have the preference, as it took the city out of many difficulties.

Councillor Ings stated that the Union Bank was prepared to loan money to the city on as good terms as any other Bank.

Councillors Byrne and Koughan were well pleased with the statement of Councillor Ings, and after both had spoken of several cases of unkind treatment by the Bank, Councillor Koughan withdrew his resolution.

Councillors Ings and Beer then withdrew their resignations as members of the Finance Committee.

Councillor Blake would not withdraw his and Councillor Byrne was appointed to fill the vacancy on the Committee.

Church of England.

DIOCESAN SYNOD HELD AT HALIFAX.

(Collected from Halifax papers.)

The fifteenth session of the Synod opened in St. Luke's Church on Tuesday morning, at a quarter past nine o'clock, with a celebration of the Holy Communion. His Lordship the Bishop celebrated, the Archdeacon reading the Epistle, and Canon Dart the Gospel. Immediately after this, the Bishop took the chair, and the Synod proceeded to business. His Lordship the Bishop delivered an address to the Synod. He expressed pleasure that now all the congregations of the Diocese are represented in the Synod. St. George's, Halifax, and St. Paul's, Charlottetown, having elected representatives. After a short resume of the history of Synods, he showed how that they are now essential, since the Crown has ceased to appoint Bishops for the Colonies. There is now no mode of filling a vacant diocese except through the action of the Synod. We have obtained the amendments to the Church Act approved at last session, and the qualifications of voters at Parish meeting is now so clearly defined as to leave no room for doubt. As the Provincial Synod is to meet in Montreal next September, the Synod was informed that it will be their duty to elect 12 representatives of each order to attend there. The Bishop thought that our representation would not be as satisfactory as it might until some means are devised for paying the heavy travelling expenses of the representatives. He told the Synod that it would be asked to petition Parliament not to tamper with the Marriage Law, and to make arrangements for sending petitions from the women as well as from the men of congregations throughout the Diocese. Since the last meeting, the Bishop has attended the great conference of Anglican Bishops at Lambeth. He said he should be happy, during the session, to answer any questions, and to give any information concerning its proceedings that may be asked or desired. After referring to a resolution passed at the last session, recognising St. Margaret's Hall as a Diocesan School for Young Ladies, he said:—"I am happy, as a visitor, to report that a good work had been done there, and that the enterprising Principal is helping to supply a serious defect in our Church organization." He went on to say that as much ought to be done for the girls as the boys, and that the work ought not to be left solely to private enterprise. The church has erected a suitable house for the boys at Windsor, and we ought also, he says, to provide one for our girls here in Halifax. A tribute was paid to the late venerable Dr. Cochran, and the absence, through illness, of Dr. White, one of the senior clergy, was referred to. The law with respect to grants to denominational colleges was next touched upon. Under the last Act of 1876 (page 40) they will all expire some time in the course of next year. The church receives \$2,400 for King's College. The loss of this, he thought, would be most disastrous. The Bishop therefore suggested that the Government be petitioned to provide by legislation in the next session for a renewal of the collegiate grants, which will otherwise cease. He also expressed the hope that the other religious denom-

inations interested in the maintenance of their several colleges, will bring their influence to bear upon the Government for the continuance of the grants, the loss of which would more or less impair their efficiency." As the Synod was congratulated on the possession of a valuable agent in the Church Guardian, a newspaper which gives so much satisfaction and is calculated to do so much good. In conclusion he said "our sessions have been ever remarkable for the absence of all bitterness, and for the general prevalence of brotherly kindness and of mutual regard for the feelings of persons taking different sides in our discussions; and I trust that this will be no exception, and that we may be all influenced by an earnest desire to promote the prosperity of that branch of the church of which we are members."

Rev. R. Wainwright was appointed Clerical Secretary. The Clerical Secretary read the report of the Executive Committee of the Synod on rights and duties of Rectors, Wardens and vestry; after which it was moved by Rev. P. Brown (St. Margaret's Bay), seconded by W. S. Gray (Annapolis):—

"That this Synod practically discountenance the pew system, that the places of parties according to wealth and rank is destructive to the Catholic truth of equality of membership in the Body of Christ, and that it is in direct opposition to Scripture and the primitive usage of the Apostolic Church."

Rev. Canon Dart (Windsor), moved in Amendment, seconded by J. J. Ritchie (Annapolis):—

"That this Synod approve of the principle of free churches, and the substitution, as far as practicable, of offerings for pew rents."

The amendment was carried.
On motion of Rev. D. C. Moore (Albion Mines), seconded by Rev. P. Brown (St. Margaret's Bay) it was—

"Resolved, That a committee be appointed to consider what is the best mode of appointment to parishes, with a view of consultation with the Synods of other Dioceses, so as to bring about, if possible, a uniform system in all the Dioceses of this Ecclesiastical Province."

Rev. Canon Dart gave notice of motion, as follows:—

"That in the judgment of this Synod it is advisable to limit the number of representatives to the Provincial Synod to eight of each order, and that a committee be appointed to prepare a petition to the Provincial Synod to this effect."

The Bishop's charge was delivered in the afternoon. His Lordship dwelt upon the proposed change in the marriage laws, and protested against it.
