U.S. Air Force Plans 600 Big Jet Bombers
WASHINGTON (AP)—Air force testimony that it plans a fleet of 600 B-52 intercontinental jet bombers by 1959 was released Thursday by a Senate sub-committee.

The new air power goal, increased by 100 planes, was disclosed with the publication of heavily censored closed-door testimony by Lt.-Gen. C. S. Irvine, deputy chief of staff in charge of air force production.

It appeared before the Senate air power investigating sub-committee which last month heard testimony that, as of then, the air force had taken delivery of 47 B-52s.

Heads College Of Family Doctors

Maritime doctor who has been active in medical, church and educational work for more than a quarter century, Dr. C.L. Gass, of "amagouche, N.S. was elected president of the College of General Practice of Canada—the national body of family doctors at their annual Board of Representatives meeting in Quebec City, Sunday.

A native of Nova Scotia, Dr. Gass was educated there at Dalhousie and Mount Allison Universities. He graduated in medicine in 1914, served in the British Army in World War 1 then settled in Sackville, New Brunswick where he began his practice. For several years he was senior physician at Sackville Medical Centre. Then for 25 years he served as campus physician and lecturer in physiology at Mount Allison University. The university awarded him an honorary doctor of laws degree in 1955 for his long public service.

Sea Cadets Will Board Visiting Warship Today

At ten o'clock this morning the 1927 ton Tribal Class destroyer escort, H.M.C.S. Haida is scheduled to slide into her assigned berth at the west side of the Railway wharf for a four day visit to the City. The ship is under the command of Commander V. Brown, C.D., R.C.N. and has a complement of fourteen officers and 216 men.

At seven thirty this morning approximately thirty Sea Cadets of R.C.S.C. Kent will board the harbour craft of the local Naval Division for the journey out to Fitzroy Bouy where they will board the Haida and be taken on an hours cruise in the Northumberland Strait.

Shortly after the ship's arrival Commodore E.F. Tisdall, C.D., Flag Officer of the squadron will make official calls upon His Honour Lieutenant Governor Province, Premier Matheson, Mayor J. D. Stewart, Brig. G.G.K. Peake, D.S.O., E.D., Officer Commanding, No. 2 Militia Group, and the Commanding Officer, H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte. He will be accompanied by his Staff Officer, Lieut. Cdr. J.G. Waters, C.D. and for the first four of the calls by Commander J.N. Kenny, R.C.N.(R). The return calls to the ship will be made at 12:30 p.m.

At five thirty the Commanding Officer and officers of the local Naval Division will hold a reception for the Commodore, the ship's captain and officers on board the Queen Charlotte.

Lieut. Governor Prowse and Mrs. Prowse are giving a ball for the ship's officers at Government House commencing at 9:30 p.m. this evening. At the same time a dance in honour of the men will be held at the Rollaway. At the Governor's ball the captain and officers of H.M.C.S. Algonquin, which is scheduled to arrive in Summerside this morning, will also be in attendance.

Saturday evening the Commodore, ship's captain and officers will hold a reception for the officers of the Charlottetown Garrison and civic leaders. The same evening the Chief and Petty Officers and men of H.M.C.S. Queen Charlotte will entertain the men.
