On the following day, Mr. Macleod, of Hunter River, shipped 200, and Mr. J. McGrath, St. John, the same number.—Somersetshire Journal.

THEY WANT REFORM.—A large meeting of citizens who believe things are going all wrong in the Halifax City Government was held in that city on Thursday evening. Half a dozen speakers told of the extravagance and stupidity of the city fathers.

A CONVICT'S DEATH.—A Kingston, Ont., despatch to the Montreal Star says: "Rapon, the convict that caused the revolt ten years ago, and has been in solitary confinement ever since, is dead." This is undoubtedly the Rapon who was convicted at Charlottetown, some years ago, of setting fire to houses at North River, and sentenced to twenty-seven years in the penitentiary.

ABANDONED FARMS.—The Boston Traveller says:—Massachusetts is not the only spot with a plethora of unoccupied farmland. Remedies for the decay of agriculture in Southeastern England make one of the main heads of the political programme of both parties in England. One landlord in Suffolk is reported to have 300 abandoned farms on his hands. The population is either emigrating or drifting to the great manufacturing centres of the Northwest.

OYSTER BOATS EXPECTED.—The Montreal Star says: The oyster boats are very late this year, is the remark at present of every lover of the succulent bivalve, and the question when are they going to arrive is heard everywhere. New York oysters are not in it when the Malpeques come along, and while the latter are now being sold everywhere, still the arrivals of the oyster boats from the lower ports might have the result of reducing the price. The schooners, however, are expected up here towards the end of this week or the beginning of next. Continuous storms around Prince Edward Island have delayed the shipments thence, and from Miramichi bay. In the meantime, however, Malpeques are selling at \$3.50 to \$5.50 per bbl., the latter for the best hand picked.
