**Tobacco Given Price Support**

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal government has extended price supports to tobacco. Agriculture Minister Hays confirmed in the House of Commons. The agricultural stabilization board has set a price of 47 cents a pound for the 1963 Ontario crop—by far the biggest in Canada. Ontario growers have encountered marketing difficulties resulting from a surplus from last year's crop.

DETROIT (AP) — Lowell Thomas, 71-year-old world traveler, radio news commentator and author, is under observation for a possible heart ailment in hospital. Thomas complained of not feeling well when he was admitted Thursday, a hospital spokesman said. The columnist, who had attended a testimonial dinner here for a long-time friend Wednesday night, was expected to remain in the hospital at least two days. His condition was "good," the hospital said.

**Reduce Population, Economist Suggests**

MONTREAL (CP) — Professor John S. Chipman, Minnesota economist, has suggested the world's people start trying to reduce population, not just cut its growth. He said the world faces the prospect of becoming one big, crowded Coney Island. So far only war, pestilence and education have kept the population down. "In my opinion," he said, "we should not only give thought to the problem of holding the world's population in check, we should begin seriously to consider whether it can be reduced perhaps to half, or why not to one-quarter, its present size." Professor Chipman, born in Montreal, is chairman of the University of Minnesota's department of economics. He was speaking at the fifth annual seminar on world affairs sponsored by Sir George Williams University in Montreal. Over-population has made it difficult for underdeveloped countries to expand, he said, and "their task has not been made easier by foreign aid programs which have concentrated on eradication of malaria and other measures to save lives." Prof. Chipman said he realized reduction of population posed a serious moral problem. However, he questioned whether the goal of the human race was to maximize its numbers at all costs.

**Quebec MP Puts In Claim For 'Most Of Labrador'**

OTTAWA (CP) — Quebec is entitled to most of Labrador and the clusters of federally-owned islands around its northern shores, Gilles Gregoire (Creditee-Lapointe) told the Commons.

**2 Parachute In Jet Crash**

WINNIPEG (CP)—An RCAF instructor and his student pilot parachuted to safety Thursday when the engine of a T-3 jet trainer failed 100 miles north of here. The RCAF said P.O. J. M. Peacock, 30, of Moncton, N.B., and J. H. Kristensen, 19, an officer cadet from Hovegaarden, Denmark, were on a training flight. They took off from the RCAF station at Bimp Man., north of Winnipeg and the plane crashed in an unpopulated area in the north of Ontario. Kristensen was undergoing jet training in Canada under a government program set up to train men from some northern European countries. 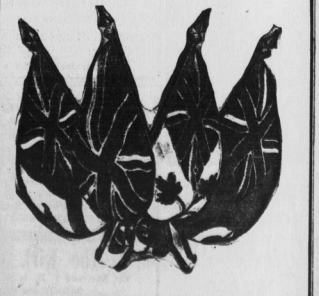
