Bub Dowling's 73 Tops Pros

SAINT JOHN (CP)—Doug Lewis of Moncton and Bill Davidson of Saint John Riversides shot a pair of 7s to take the lead in the amateur field of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island golf championship in the first round of play at Riverside Golf and Country Club Monday.

Davidson held a two-stroke lead over Lewis at the end of nine holes with a 37 on the Moncton player's 39 but faltered in the back nine, taking 36 shots compared to Lewis' 34 and the pair will tie off in the second round today all even.

In the professional competition, Cecil Dowling of Charlottetown took a first-round lead with an identical score, one stroke better than Riversiders Don Sinclair who came in with a 74.

Alan Ogilvie of Moncton followed with 75 and Pete Kelly of Bathurst had 76.

TORONTO (CP)—This city, which hasn't staged a fight of major importance in more than 25 years, is fast taking on the appearance of a world boxing capital. Fight figures are here from London and New York and more are expected before Wednesday's heavyweight bout.

While the principals—Archie Moore and James J. Parker—tailed off their training at camps 135 miles north of Toronto, promoters put the finishing touches to the pre-fight spectacle. If everything goes as scheduled, Toronto fans likely will see one of the most colorful sports events in years.

Two former heavyweight champions arrived during the weekend. Rocky Marciano, who vacated the title a few months ago, came in Sunday to report on the training camps and also on the 15-round fight for a Toronto newspaper.

LOUIS ARRIVES

Joe Louis, one of the great heavyweight champions of all time, checked in Monday. Another arrival was Charlie Goldman, trainer for Marciano and one of the best-known corner men in the game. He will watch the fight as a spectator.

Expected today or Wednesday are James D. Norris, president of the powerful International Boxing Club, with a couple of his associates.

Mantle Hoping For Triple Crown

NEW YORK (AP)—Mickey Mantle, New York Yankee's switch-hitting outfielder, hopes to become the American League's first triple crown winner since Boston's Ted Williams in 1947.

Mantle stands an excellent chance of accomplishing the feat. He leads the league in batting with .371, home runs with 32 and runs batted in with 82. The 24-year-old slugger also has scored the most runs, 80, and has collected the most hits, 117.

Mantle homered twice last week and drove in eight runs while hitting his batting average six points. He picked up ground in the batting race on runnerup Charley Maxwell of Detroit, Tiger, who remains second with .352. Maxwell's average failed to change.

The Tigers' Harvey Kuenn still is third at .346.

BAILEY TAKES OVER

In the National League, batting race, Cincinnati's Ed Bailey has displaced Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cards as the pace-setter.

Bailey boosted his average 18 points to .344 as Milwaukee's Hank Aaron moved in second, ahead of Musial, with .336. Stan is third at .334.

"We thought we would be able to get the RCMP, but now we know we can't," promotions director Andy Niederreiter said.

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No C. B. C. T. V. Of Toronto Fight

OTTAWA (CP)—There will be "positively" no CBC television coverage of the Moore-Parker fight in Toronto Wednesday night.

Jaremy First Man Ever To Swim 32-Mile Lake Ontario

TORONTO (CP)—Steamfitter Johnny Jaremy became the first man ever to swim the 32 miles across western Lake Ontario Monday and went home to sleep before collecting prizes that include coupons for 100 free milkshakes.

While the city cheered the 195-pound, 36-year-old native of Port Arthur, Ont., a fatigue licked three other marathons who had followed him into the lake from the mouth of the Niagara River.

They were veteran distance swimmer Winnie Roach Leuzler, 30, of Calgary and Toronto, the first Canadian to swim the English Channel; Jim Woods, 40, of Asheville, N.C.

Jaremy, oddly enough, was the only unknown of the four. Mary Leuzler, mother of three, was making her second try—she failed in 1954—and had covered 10 miles when, six-foot waves drained her strength. Woods was on his second bid in two weeks and Wheatcroft devoted 28 hours last year to trying to beat the lake. Woods covered 16 miles Monday.

Jaremy is only the second to make the swim of the dozens who have tried. The first was Toronto's Marlin Bell, who turned the trick at 16 in 1954. She now is training for a crack at the Strait of Juan de Fuca from Vancouver Island to Port Angeles, Wash., slightly more than 18 miles.
