Game Act, Other Cases Are Heard By Magistrate

The case of a French river farmer charged in Queens County Magistrate's Court Wednesday with keeping live game birds within a quarter of a mile of an area where shooting was taking place, an offence contrary to the Migratory Game Birds Act, was adjourned until January 8th by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet.
 At that time argument will be presented by both counsel for the accused, F.A. Latta, Q.C., and for the Crown, Gerald R. Foster.
 In a similar charge the father of the first accused, the evidence as recorded in the case involving the son was accepted and this case was also adjourned until the same date.
 The first to give evidence was John W. White of Montague, the Provincial Game Warden, who told of conducting a patrol with Cst. Wilford R.C.M.P. on October 19 in French River, in the district and at the farm of the accused he observed three Canada geese in an open topped enclosure and two more in a completely enclosed pen, about 50 to 60 yards apart.
 He returned again on October 21 in company with Cst. Brown on this occasion he saw a hunter in a strawstack blind near a fence line situated about 110 paces from the pen containing the two geese. The hunter he said was in possession of an unplugged shotgun, which held more than three shells. There was also a dead goose lying under the straw. Witness said he seized both the gun and the goose.
 Cst. Maxwell Bowles, corroborated the evidence given by the Game Warden in relation to the events of October 21, Cst. William Wilson corroborated that portion covering the 19th.

HELD PERMIT

The accused giving testimony on his own behalf said that he himself had kept live Canada geese for the past three years and that his father had done the same for more than forty years. He also stated that he was in possession of a permit allowing him to keep the birds.
 When questioned accused said this year he had kept two geese and one gosling. The latter would be reported to the authorities on the form which was required to be filled out at the end of December each year.
 Under cross examination the accused said that he had hunted on his own property and shot from the haystack blind. Three other witnesses appeared for the defence. One told of selling the two geese to the accused and corroborated the rest of the evidence. Another said that he knew that hunting had been going on within the limits of the property in question, while the third substantiated the evidence given by previous witnesses.
SEVEN CHARGES
 Three charges of breaking, entering and theft along with four of joyriding were this morning laid against a resident of North Winsoe. No plea was taken and

has engaged in the work under leadership given by Allison Gill and local president, assisted by Miriam Horn and Mrs. Gill.
 The accused was remanded until December 20.
 The first break occurred at the home of Wilfred Holmes, Union Road on the night of October 17, and the accused is alleged to have taken a sum of money amounting to forty dollars.
 The second break took place at the store of Ernest Cudmore at Oyster Bed Bridge on December 4, in which the sum of five dollars was taken. The third break also took place at the Cudmore store on December 12. On this occasion a 22 rifle was taken along with a quantity of ammunition and numerous other goods having a value of approximately ninety dollars. Gerald R. Foster represented the accused.
 The previously adjourned case of a Charlottetown man charged with the unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than the residence in which he resides was concluded. The magistrate then adjourned the case until December 23 for consideration.
 Evidence previously taken in this case indicated that the RCMP had seized 11 dozen pints of beer and six pints of liquor in a rail coach conducted on a Bishop Street residence. Police evidence disclosed that the raid was carried out following a complaint received. Lester O'Donnell appeared for the accused, John P. Nicholson for the Crown.
 A resident of Greenfield who had previously entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of driving while intoxicated, changed his plea to that of guilty to driving while impaired. This was accepted and a fine of sixty dollars and cost of thirty days was imposed.
