A Secret Well Kept.

Probably the only secret process which has been kept inviolate, and for ages openly defied the world of science, is the iron trade of Russia. In one case a letter attached to a kite, which was allowed to escape, was picked up by a peasant, and despite their protestations that they could not read, they were at once put to death by the guards to whom they delivered the letter, and it was afterwards decreed that the guards themselves should pass the remainder of their days within the works. The wonderful properties of the iron are so well known that it is unnecessary to enlarge upon them.
