Even the medical profession seems to have fallen into line. A prominent physician advocates the formation of a State Medical Board to be paid by the state, of course. Every doctor to be an officer of health as a policeman is an office to keep order—the average pay to be about \$5,000 per year. This socialism seems to be so catching that before one is fairly done wondering at some such proposition another springs up. I should say it was "in the air" and I am sorrowfully constrained to say that it does really look as if the human race must pass through a phase of this kind of industrial slavery—where a monster called the "state" will do everything and be everything—before man will finally and fully emerge into intelligent freedom and happiness.
