## Centre Will Host Antique Car Show

Confederation Centre's Memorial Hall, which has been the scene of everything from Go Go Dances to formal ceremonies, plays a new role this weekend, as the site of the first Antique Car exhibition ever staged on Prince Edward Island. A dozen vintage vehicles will be brought into Memorial Hall for exhibition to the public on Friday and Saturday, through the co-sponsorship of the Centre and the P.E.I. Antique Car Club, as a prelude to a projected Maritime Show to be staged in the late spring of next year.

No prizes will be awarded during this weekend's exhibition, but there will be plenty of opportunity for the public to meet and talk with car owners about their unusual vehicles, and the methods used to restore them to their original grandeur. The exhibition will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. on both Friday and Saturday. A nominal admission fee of fifty cents for adults and twenty-five cents for children under twelve will be charged. The main entrance to Memorial Hall will be closed during the exhibition, and access must be gained through the box office entrance to the concourse.

**FAMILIAR SIGHTS**—The automobiles of the antique car club have been familiar sights in parades all over the Island since the formation of the organization in 1954, but never before have they been assembled for a close inspection by the public. At least a dozen vehicles ranging from a 1920 MacLaughlin-Buick Sedan to a 1922 Model T Express truck will be on display. The city of Charlottetown Fire Department is also expected to add a distinctively colorful note by loaning their 1938 model fire engine for the occasion.

Whatever the purpose of restoration, the result is a fascinating example of the auto-makers art of generations ago, and one which seems to have tremendous fascination for people of all ages and interests. Large numbers of those people are expected at Memorial Hall this weekend.

## Reading Council Is Formed Here

A new council of the International Reading Association has been formed in the Prince County Area. The organization meeting was held at the Summerside High School.

Claude Wood, Supervisor of Schools, chaired the meeting and introduced Helen Yeo, of the Education Department of Prince of Wales College. Miss Yeo outlined the development and purposes of the International Reading Association.

The primary aim of the organization is to improve the quality of reading at all levels and to develop an awareness of the impact of reading upon the citizenry.

**MEMBERSHIP OPEN**—Membership is open to all persons engaged in teaching or supervision of reading, as well as all those interested in the purpose of the organization.

At present there are 429 councils throughout the world, with a membership of over 41,000. Councils are organized in 8 out of 10 Canadian provinces.

Elmer MacDonald, Director of Guidance Services for the Charlottetown schools, explained that reading is not merely a sensory process, but it is a thinking and understanding process as well, and that if teachers of reading are to achieve highest excellence in their art, they need to know its scientific basis. She also outlined some program ideas, suggesting that it is a good idea to have a theme each year and to prepare a program outline in advance so that there will be time for adequate preparation of each.

Some of the suggested themes included: treating reading difficulties, reading in the content areas, grouping and its correlates, slow children in the regular reading program and individualizing the reading program.

## ARDA Grant Approved For Province

Three ARDA projects for the Maritime Provinces, with a total cost of more than \$20,000, have been approved. The announcement was made today by federal forestry and rural development minister Maurice Sauve, New Brunswick agriculture minister Adrien Levesque, Nova Scotia agriculture and marketing minister I.W. Akerley and Prince Edward Island agriculture and marketing minister Daniel J. MacDonald.

The New Brunswick project will see the federal and provincial governments each contributing \$5,000 towards a study of engineering and land use aspects of the Keswick Islands, located at the junction of the Keswick and St. John rivers. The project will result in preparation of a plan to assure the maintenance and maximum utilization of the fertile soil of the islands.

In Nova Scotia, the federal government will contribute \$22,500 towards a \$60,000 project to prevent river bank erosion throughout the province.

In Prince Edward Island, a provincial park adjacent to the newly constructed Reardon's Dam, will be developed, with the federal government contributing half of the \$12,000 required for landscaping and other improvements.
