**Spokesman Explains Trend In Canada-U.S. Sugar Prices**

MONTREAL (CP)—A sugar refinery spokesman said Friday Canadian sugar prices are higher than those of the United States because the American raw sugar market has more stability than the world market.

Canada buys her raw sugar for refining on the world market in London and prices in Canada fluctuate in accordance with those of the world market, said the spokesman.

"Law and refined sugar imports are richly controlled by quotas in the United States under the sugar act. No Canadian sugar is allowed to enter the U.S.," he said.

The spokesman said suppliers with quotas have captive markets which normally command premium prices in the U.S. For this reason, the American price is determined by the New York sugar market, which does not fluctuate as much as the world market where Canadians buy. **PAY FOR STABILITY**

"At this moment, U.S. refiners are obtaining raw sugar at cheaper prices than Canadian," said the spokesman, "but over the long term the American consumers pay for this stability."

The average wholesale price for 100 pounds of sugar over the past 10 years in the United States is \$8.96 compared with \$7.46 for Canada in the same period.

Both prices are expressed in Canadian funds. Sources in the bureau of statistics and the Willett and Gray statistical survey trade journal.

"This is only the third time since the Second World War that the Canadian sugar price has been higher than those in the United States," said the spokesman.

The wholesale price of refined sugar in New York City is \$14.60 in Canadian funds compared with \$18.63 in Montreal, he said.

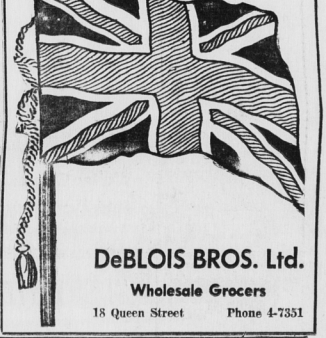
