We learn that the amount taken at the Custom House for "Ex-Warehouse Duties," in two days, amounted to about \$51,000, while the Excise Duties amounted to \$2,000 in the same period.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] DOMINION PARLIAMENT Sir John's Illness. OTTAWA, March 12. Sir John has been in bed all day by advice of his physician, but will likely be able to take his seat on Monday. Protection of the Fisheries. Capt. P. A. Scott, R. N., will be gazetted Fishery Officer under the Fishery Act, and commander of all steamers owned or chartered by the Government for the protection of the fisheries. An Emphatic Contradiction. The statement which has appeared in Grit organs in the Maritime Provinces that the Government had abandoned the idea of prohibiting the catching of lobsters for three years till after the elections, I am authorized by the Minister of Fisheries to contradict in a most emphatic way no regulations for prohibiting lobster catching having been at any time framed or contemplated. The Riel Question. After introduction of several bills, the House took up further consideration of Landry's resolution of censure, Royal having the floor. He pointed out that Amyot was not entitled to much consideration, seeing that he had deliberately attempted to mislead the House or had been ignorant of what he was talking about. Royal contended that Riel had justly paid the penalty of his crime. Gigault, who followed, condemned the Government for allowing the sentence of the Court to be carried out for several reasons, which he gave. He accused the Government of being influenced by Orangemen in other Provinces, therefore they disregarded the Province of Quebec when it pleaded to spare Riel's life. Wallace, of York, who then spoke, said the whole cause of the opposition had been directed by the desperate position in which they found their political fortune. They wanted office, and were prepared to take any stick to beat Sir John with. Blake, in 1870, had made long and severe speeches, based on newspaper reports, and had, without waiting of official papers, moved that \$5,000 be offered for the capture of Louis Riel. Replying to charges against the orangemen, he said there were about 2,000 Orange Lodges in the Dominion, and not more than six had ever brought the question of Riel up, or expressed any opinion. Not a single petition had been sent to the Government to have Riel hanged. After recess, Cameron, of Huron, made a violent speech, declaring Riel's execution a judicial murder; that the Government contained greater criminals than Riel, and stating he would vote for Landry's motion. House adjourned at the close of Cameron's speech at 11.20. Rioting in Toronto. TORONTO, March 12. There was great excitement on the streets to-day, and many heads, both of civilians and policemen, were broken. The police authorities were determined to see that the street cars were run this morning. The first car was started from the stables, manned by twelve policemen, and from that time till about four this afternoon, when the cars were stopped running, there were continuous collisions between police and mob. A meeting of the City Council was held, and deputations were appointed to endeavor to effect a settlement. Their efforts were crowned with success, the company agreeing to take back the men under the same conditions that existed prior to the strike and no questions asked, but reserving to themselves the right to discharge any found to belong to the Knights of Labor. Work will be resumed to-morrow. Schaefer Wins Again. NEW YORK, March 12. The fourth billiard game between Schaefer and Vignaux to-night was won by Schaefer. Score, 609 to 243. In the twentieth inning Schaefer made 230, the highest run on record at this game. Rebels Marching on Mandalay. LONDON, March 12. A despatch from Rangoon has informed the authorities that 12,000 rebels intend to march on Mandalay. British reinforcements are pushing forward to assist the garrison. The Flying Column. KINGSTON, March 12. Col. Cotton has been notified from Ottawa that no men from a battery will be required to proceed to the Northwest at present, and that a flying column will not be sent forward this spring. Suicide at Niagara Falls. CHIPPewa, Ont., March 12. An unknown man committed suicide at Niagara Falls this morning by jumping into the river and swimming right over the cataract. He was a rather large man, and wore dark overcoat and felt hat. Bismarck's Spirit Bill Defeated. BERLIN, March 12. Prince Bismarck's spirit monopoly bill was to-day rejected by committee of the Reichstag, 20 to 5. This action virtually defeats the measure. Holland's Socialists. AMSTERDAM, March 12. The police this afternoon charged with swords upon a large crowd of socialists who had assembled in the aristocratic quarters of the city. An Orphanage in Flames. BERLIN, March 12. The orphanage for boys in Noerde was destroyed by fire. Five inmates perished in the flames and thirty injured.

LONDON, March 12. A petroleum well has been struck near Suskin. An official report of the collision on the railway between Monte Carlo and Meriton, on Wednesday, places the number killed at four; injured, at 23. 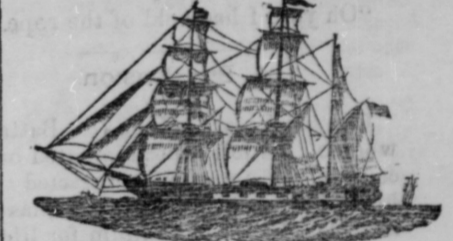
