"THE UNDERLYING MOTIVE."

SIR.—In a recent issue of THE EXAMINER a letter appeared with the above heading, and while it may voice the sentiments of many Canadians yet I think it conveys a wrong impression.

Permit me, as a resident of one of the most loyal of American cities, to say that the great mass of the American people are by no means unfriendly to Great Britain, on the contrary they are anxious for such an alliance as the passage of the recently defeated arbitration treaty would have brought about. It is an admitted fact that the best minds of the United States Senate were favorable to the treaty, and had it not been fathered by Richard Olney, the unpopular mouthpiece of an unpopular president, it is the better opinion that it would have been accepted.

Mr. Chauncey D. Pew's utterance should not carry great weight at this time. As being admittedly a man of world, he is at present somewhat anti-British by reason of his recent prominent connection with a certain fair held in New York. Had he been selected as ambassador to the Court of St. James, which post it is admitted, he coveted, the language attributed to him would, I venture to say, never have been used. And it cannot with fairness, be said that Mr. Dana's personal ideas, as expressed in his paper, the Sun, voice the sentiments of the other great Democratic journals of the metropolis any more than do the frequent anti-British squibs in the Boston Globe, which is, by the way, almost wholly conducted by Canadians, voice the sentiments of Boston journalism.

The annual parade of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery Company, of Boston, which took place yesterday, recalls the interchange of courtesies upon the occasion of this organization visiting the parent company in London last year. The company was entrusted with a message from the Governor of Massachusetts to the Prince of Wales, and their visit was everywhere commented upon as showing how near the two countries were to each other. Again the recent formal transfer of the Mayflower log by the Bishops of London through Ambassador Bayard to this Commonwealth was another occasion upon which some of the country's great men, greater in many ways than Dr. Depew, expressed the warm feelings of the people of the United States for England and her Queen.

I might cite many incidents to show that your learned correspondent is wrong in drawing the conclusions he does and chiefly from the unauthorized utterances of a few non-representative judges. But permit me to say that did he live here, he would learn that the best people, the people after all who carry weight, are friendly in the highest degree to the mother country, and do not desire war.

Last Sunday several prominent clergymen took for their text Queen Victoria's coming Jubilee, and, judging from the newspaper reports, they spoke in the highest terms of Her Majesty, and commended the efforts of those in authority on both sides of the water in bringing the two nations so near each other.

In conclusion let me say that from my observations, made during the past two years, while residing here, I cannot believe that these two great nations are unfriendly to each other, but on the contrary, think the day is not far distant, when they will be as united for their mutual advantage and welfare as it is possible for two independent countries to be.

JUBILEE REGALIAS.—Charlottetown Lodge No. 68, I. O. G. T., last night decided to order by telegraph from Toronto twenty-five parade regalias to be used for the Queen's Jubilee celebration. The regalias are of blue material handsomely silver mounted. Two candidates were initiated and several proposed at last night's meeting. Charlottetown Lodge is always to the fore in every popular movement and is making every effort to have a good turnout for the jubilee although many of its members are connected with other societies.

ESCAPED FROM JAIL.—Martin Power, confined in Queen's County jail awaiting trial in the Supreme Court for receiving stolen goods, made his escape from that institution yesterday afternoon. It seems that about five o'clock Martin and William Power and Gallant the bicycle hero, were let out for their rounds. A few minutes later William Power and Gallant returned to the room, but Martin could not be found. He had evidently scaled the jail fence, aided by some person or persons outside. Jailor Harvie was on the jail steps when the prisoners were let out, but it is impossible for one man to see all over the yard.
