TROUBLE IN THE BYERS FAMILY.—Mr. and Mrs. Benj. Byers had a "little one" pleasantness" on the streets yesterday afternoon, in the course of which "Benny" struck his wife on the mouth. Both had evidently been drinking; but were not considered sufficiently inebriated to be fit subjects for arrest by the police who came along shortly after the row. THE CHURCH AND PROHIBITION.—A Toronto despatch says: The City Ministerial Association, representing all Protestant bodies, save the Anglican church, in reply to the request of representatives of the Dominion Alliance who waited on the Association today asking for aid in pledging 100,000 voters at the next general election to support only candidates pledged to prohibition, passed the following resolution declining to interfere: "While we deeply sympathize with the object to be accomplished, we deem it best that each minister should work on the lines best suited to his judgment."
