TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

CANADIAN.

St. Valier Station, I. C. R., May 31.

At 7.30 p.m. on Saturday an old deaf man named Jean Roy, was killed by a locomotive on the railway track, about half way west of this station. An inquest was held yesterday evening.

Quebec, May 31. Dr. Kingdon, (the Bishop designate of New Brunswick) arrived in Quebec on Sunday last, by the "Sarmatian" and is the guest of the Bishop of Quebec. He leaves Quebec on Wednesday morning.

Toronto, May 31. A meeting of short horn breeders in this city decided to establish a new herd book for Canada. Another meeting will be held on Thursday.

Montreal, May 31. A meeting of the directors of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., was held here yesterday, in reference to the taking over of the Canada Central Railway. Messrs. Stephen, Angus, McIntyre and Kennedy were present.

The Minister of Justice has entered an action for \$2,000 against the Montreal Cotton Company, for some water lots at Valleyfield.

Several hundred emigrants arrived here to-day by the steamer Sarmatian and subsequently left for the West.

An unknown man committed suicide yesterday on the Occidental Railway, by throwing himself before the train.

Ottawa, May 31. The Customs Department have during the past week seized 40,000 feet of tiles for undervaluation. They were entered at 18 cents per foot and are claimed to be worth from 23 to 28 cents per foot.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

LONDON, May 31. The Monkland coal and iron company, Glasgow, has passed a bill in favor of winding up its affairs.

The Cuckoo thinks the Cornell crew will be allowed to enter the Henley regatta, as the rules were not printed in any foreign newspaper.

At a crowded meeting of the Land League of Great Britain, last night, it was resolved to hold a demonstration against the Coercion Act in Hyde Park, on Sunday next.

It is stated Egan was in the stranger's gallery during the debate in the Commons last night.

The Times says it is believed that the Irish executive has strongly represented to the Cabinet the necessity of adopting measures for the suppression of the Land League. It is the League he permitted to continue its work it will bring the masses of the Irish people into physical conflict with the British Crown.

It is reported that Mitchell Henry does not intend to proceed further with the Egan affair, but that he and those who acted with him are perfectly satisfied with the House having declared the letter a breach of privilege.

The World says that Sarah Bernhardt is to marry, on Saturday next, M. Agelo, who has been travelling with her in America.

At a special meeting of the Cabinet, today, it is understood that the state of Ireland was discussed.

In the Commons, to-day, a motion by Richard Power in favor of the adjournment of the House for the Derby was carried by a vote of 246 to 119, amid loud cheers. Wilfred Lawson (Radical) opposed the motion.

The House of Commons, in committee on the land bill, to-night, rejected an amendment limiting the right of free sale to tenancies of and below £30.

The yearly meeting of bondholders of the confederate cotton loan of 1863 was held today. The general tenor of the speeches was to the effect that, although the bondholders had no legal claim on the American Government something might be done if a friendly appeal was made. The speakers seemed to have their hopes on the fact that the Bank of England still held some residue of loan.

An unusual number of detectives watched those who entered the Land League office on Tuesday. A crowd assailed the detectives who conveyed Mr. Kettle to Naas Jail on Monday.

CORK, May 31. About forty persons were injured in the riot at Mitchells town, on Friday. Complete order has been restored.

DUBLIN, May 31. At the Land League meeting to-day Seaton said he had visited Dillon and regretted to find his delicate condition was seriously affected by his incarceration.

The Gazette proclaims one barony in the County Meath and three parishes in Donegal under the coercion act.

UNITED STATES.

NORFOLK, May 31. A locust plague is said to be ravaging the whole of one section of North Carolina, eating up corn and crops and every kind of vegetation, and destroying whole forests of valuable saw mill timber by stripping the bark and depositing their eggs. The injury is said to be incalculable.

PHILADELPHIA, May 31. P. P. Deason of Cambridge, Mass., injured in the back and ankle at the railroad disaster yesterday, states that the car he was in turned over, with the top opposite the following car, and in the same instant he said, a pair of trucks of the same car cut through his, at the seat across the aisle

from him, in which were a man named Ritter, with his wife and infant, and he saw Ritter, who was sitting next the window, cut in two at the waist. At the same time the mother threw her child across the aisle into his arms, when he with the child and the woman crawled through the window and he handed the child to its mother, but did not tell her he had seen her husband killed. Deason judges there were about thirty people in his car. He also saw a man's scalp cut open from the back of his neck to his forehead, but does not know what he came of him.

A violent wind and rain storm swept over Dallas on Sunday night. There were wind, rain and hail storms in various portions of the State, in many instances tally destroying the fruit and serious injury to corn, cotton and wheat crops. A fearful hail storm visited South McLennan and the north part of Bell counties on Saturday night, and a number of farm houses were torn down. One lady was killed and two men were badly hurt in Leon county. At McLennan several houses were unroofed. At Sate Fea building was partially destroyed.

WESTONVILLE, Kansas, May 31. McCarthy & Hodgson's new store was entered by masked robbers, last evening, who compelled the proprietors to keep quiet, at the point of the revolver, and robbed the safe of between \$12,000 and \$14,000. The robbers then made off, and no trace of them has yet been discovered.
