PRESENTS FOR ISLAND BOYS

Tidworth, Wilts, Eng., March 16, 1915.

Sir:—Below is a list of seventeen Island boys for whom I hold Christmas presents forwarded by the Red Cross Society, and whom I am unable to locate, although every method has been tried except this one. If their friends would kindly forward me their correct address, stating first their regimental number, and their rank, whether private, corporal or sergeant, etc., number of the company, section, squadron, battery and battalion or corps, as the case may be, I believe it will yet be possible to deliver the parcels to them. It is important that a private soldier's address should be definite. If an infantryman, the number of his battalion and the number of his company, rank first in importance; if an artilleryman, the number of his battery and his brigade; if a member of a mounted corps, the name of the corps and the number of the squadron or troop. It is not necessary to name the locality, as the General Post Office in London know at all times where the different units of the Canadian Expeditionary Force are located. A sample address is as follows: "Regimental No. 23069 Pte. John Smith "E" Company 12 Battalion Canadian Expeditionary Force

With respect to Non Commissioned officers, from lance corporals to sergeants, it is not necessary to name their company, as there are only about one hundred and thirty (130) non-commissioned officers to a battalion, while there are nine hundred and thirty (930) private soldiers.

In regard to officers, it is only necessary to give their rank, such as Lieutenant, Captain or Major, and the number of their battalion, as there are only twenty-seven (27) officers to a battalion. Non-commissioned officers and privates are known first by regimental number, afterwards by name. Officers have no regimental number.

I make reference to this matter of address because of the vast amount of mail that cannot be delivered because of insufficient address, and it is wonderful sometimes how the whole face of an envelope will be covered and yet the one essential thing left out that would have easily carried the letter to the party for whom it was intended, and the people at home must not forget that there are over thirty thousand (30,000) men, officers, non-commissioned officers and privates, in the First Canadian Expeditionary Force. Islanders in war are like Islanders in peace, they won't stick together, and because of this lack of cohesion, are scattered throughout the whole Expeditionary Force.
