SONS OF TEMPERANCE.—From official reports received from Chas. E. Gibbons, Esq., one of the Reception Committee, we are glad to find the National Division, at its recent session in New York city, has again honored the Island by conferring on Rev. Dr. Fisher the office of M. W. Chaplain. The strength of the order in P. E. Island, March 31, was 1,915. The total result of the order was 67,663. This is exclusive of Great Britain and Australia. 10 divisions have recently been chartered in Winnipeg and British Columbia. Two of the original founders of the order are still living—John Oliver and John McElbannon. They were present at the fiftieth anniversary, and, when introduced by Rev. Dr. Cuyler, were heartily applauded. The thirty column for the past year contains the names W. B. Wadman, of California (brother of I. W. Wadman, of this city), R. M. Barratt, Judge Young, and thirteen other members of the National Division of North America.

ARTISTIC WORK.—The interior of the drawing room of the Bishop's Palace has been artistically frescoed and decorated by Mr. P. H. Trainor, of this city. A reporter of THE EXAMINER, who has been shown the work performed by Mr. Trainor, cheerfully bears testimony to its excellence. The main panel of the ceiling is embossed and painted in oil colors of delicate lavender tint. The frieze surrounding the main panel is laid off with smaller panels and raised mouldings, lines and ornaments. The styles are nice tints of terra cotta. A raised cornice ex ends around the wall of the room. Below this cornice is a frieze with an ornamental scroll in crimson and gold colors. The main panels of the room are highly embossed in shell and fan patterns, and painted in delicate tints of sea and olive greens. Below is a dais of Grecian pattern, finely executed. The woodwork of the room is painted a bone white, and is artistically executed. Mr. Trainor, by the excellence of his work in this case, has certainly placed himself in the front rank of decorative artists and has proved most conclusively that it is now no longer necessary to send abroad for workmen when high-class work in this particular line is to be performed. We learn that His Lordship Bishop Macdonald has arranged with Mr. Robert Harris, R. C. A., for the painting of a portrait of the late lamented Bishop McIntyre, which will be placed in the drawing room with the portraits of Bishops McEachern and Macdonald.

TENNYSON'S FUNERAL.

A Simple Ceremony.

LONDON, Oct. 12. When living, Lord Tennyson often expressed his aversion for hearses. Yesterday, when his body was removed from Oldsworth, the coffin was carried from the house by his old servants, and placed in a small cart. The relatives formed in procession behind the cart and started for the station. Upon arriving at London, the body was at once taken to Westminster Abbey. Canon Duckworth offered a brief prayer and the simple ceremony was ended.

Marine Wrecks and Fatalities.

LONDON, Oct. 12. A despatch from Boulogne says that the captain of a sloop which arrived there, reports that on Sunday morning, the sloop, while about 200 miles off St. Valery Sur Somme, driving through a furious storm, passed a large number of human bodies floating in the sea, surrounded by a quantity of wreckage. The captain says that he counted forty corpses.

The unknown vessel stuck on Hasbro Sand. To day, tug and the crew of the local life boat put out to her assistance. The place where the vessel struck is some distance off shore. Shortly after the boats started to assist her a heavy fog shut down, closing the vessel from sight. When the boats from shore reached the place where they judged the vessel should be, they found she had disappeared. They met a large quantity of floating wreckage, among which was a number of timbers and casks, the latter marked "Hansel." A close search of the waters failed to find any trace of the crew.

Disastrous Fire.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 12. Last night a most disastrous fire broke out in the livery stables of John McCoy. The flames rapidly spread to the carriage factory of Coopers, Henderson and Wilson, and soon both the buildings were reduced to ashes. A building adjoining the livery stable, occupied by S. J. King, Post Office Inspector, and owned by W. H. Thorne, was next wrecked, and two barns were also destroyed.
