

Death Of Well Known Island Sportsman

One of the better known sportsmen of the island, R. J. 'Ronnie' MacDonald, 69, died Wednesday night in the Charlottetown Hospital after a brief illness. A native of Antigonish, N. S., he came to the island in 1914 as a telegraph linesman and then served with the Canadian National Telegraphs until his retirement approximately five years ago.

During all his years in this city he was one of the leaders in sports, especially hockey and football, as he encouraged countless youths and helped them in many ways. All his life he stressed the importance of manliness and playing the game at all times. Clean sport and recreation were his beliefs and he always endeavored to instill them in all the boys he aided or encouraged.

The late Mr. MacDonald had a host of friends he had made over the years. In recent years he had been one of the strongest supporters of the Islanders Hockey Club, but long before he staunchly supported the Abegweit of another era.

He was a member of the Holy Name Society and of the Knights of Columbus in the Charlottetown Council. The latter society will attend the funeral in a body.

Surviving are his wife, the former Mary Hamill of Central Quebec, and five sons and five daughters. They are Frank, Toronto; Gregory, R.C.A.F.; Bennett, Saint John; Charles, Charlottetown; Kenneth, a student at St. Dunstan's University. The girls are Rita, Toronto; Hazel, Charlottetown; Lenora, Mrs. John O'Neill, Halifax; Laurie, Montreal; and Betty, R.N., Welland, Ontario.

Funeral services will be held from his late residence, 173 Hillsboro street, Saturday morning to St. Dunstan's Basilica. Interment will be in the Catholic Cemetery.
