

Canada Nuclear Bases Are Seen Necessary

OTTAWA (CP) — Three highly qualified sources indicated Monday they think establishment of nuclear bases in Canada is necessary until nuclear disarmament is achieved.

Edmonton and Calgary but, Mr. Hooke said, "I can't understand their attitudes because they are going to gain the most from the legislation."

Alberta would be the first province to establish a provincial industrial tax program under which industrial taxes on some plants—those "creating a problem"—would be collected by the province and distributed to the municipalities.

The municipalities traditionally have collected industrial taxes. They likely will be allowed to continue to do so except in cases where the plants "create a problem."

Mr. Hooke described "problem plants" as those mainly on the outskirts of cities—with the workers using city utilities and services—and paying their industrial taxes to the rural municipalities.

POLITICAL SWITCHING?
Some city officials have no objection to a uniform assessment but fear that if industrial taxing powers are surrendered to the provincial government, distribution might be influenced by political motives.

The issue springs largely from a move by Edmonton and its suburbs to amalgamate. Edmonton has sought the entire industrial tax collected in Strathcona. It says it would need the money if it is to amalgamate with the debt-ridden suburbs.

Mr. Hooke said if Edmonton took over the industrial Strathcona, the remainder of the rural municipality would be left practically bankrupt.

A student-faculty delegation from the University of Toronto presented a petition to Prime Minister Diefenbaker urging nuclear control and disarmament. It avoided reference to Canada's plan to allow the United States to place nuclear warheads on Canadian soil.

The delegation leader, Professor David Gauthier, told reporters after a 1½-hour interview that any spread of nuclear weapons is in itself undesirable, but added:

"We have never said it cannot be justified. In a particular case there may be grounds for exception."

IN AGREEMENT.
Prime Minister Diefenbaker, also interviewed after the meeting, said he and the university group saw eye-to-eye on the question. But he did not elaborate.

Nuclear warheads under U.S. control are expected to be placed at Bomarc missile bases being erected in central Canada.

Meanwhile, in Montreal, the ambassador to Canada, Richard B. Wiglesworth, said his country realized an obligation to prevent an increase in the number of holders of nuclear weapons.

However, he said, it is clear that a nuclear deterrent must be maintained until no longer required. Thus it was necessary to provide nuclear arms to NATO allies.

DANGER LESSENERD
By retaining control of use of such foreign-based weapons the

The delegation presented Mr. Diefenbaker with a petition signed by some 630 members of the university faculty and by 2,500 students. Signatories included university President Claude T. Bissell and heads of most of the institution's colleges.

It urged the government to press in the councils of the world for an immediate end to the testing and production of nuclear weapons to check "the increasing danger of world war" and as a step towards world disarmament.

Mr. Diefenbaker at the end of the meeting asked the petitioners to prepare a brief outlining in detail the consensus of their views on courses the government should pursue.

The five delegates said this will be taken up by the 15-member university committee on nuclear disarmament.

Professor Gauthier said there is some sympathy at the university for a suggestion that Canada become a trustee state of the United Nations and surrender her military sovereignty to the world body.

Good Drivers Get Discounts

MONTREAL (CP) — Accident-free drivers and owners of cars that cost less than average to repair will benefit most from changes in 1960 automobile insurance rates, the All Canada Insurance Federation said Monday.

The federation said that drivers with a five-year accident-free record will be given higher discounts than those already in effect for drivers with a one-year, two-year and three-year safety record.

The five-year safety discount will be 8 per cent off standard rates provided the insured car

averages less than 10,000 miles annually, is not used for business or is not driven by anyone under the age of 25. If the car is used to drive to work, there will be a 45 per cent discount provided the driver is 25 years of age or over.

Other accident-free discounts are 10 per cent for the first year, 20 per cent for the second year and 35 per cent for the third successive year without an accident.

The federation said lower rates on cars that prove to be less costly to repair will be put into effect as soon as possible. It indicated this would apply mostly to the smaller models.

Tax Imbalance Is Created By Industrialization Of Oil

EDMONTON (CP) — Industrialization of Alberta resulting from the discovery of oil has created a serious tax imbalance, provincial authorities say.

Crux of the problem is that many industries have located in suburbs which receive heavy tax benefits while their workers enjoy the services of the adjacent city.
