

Commends Provision For Agricultural Engineer

"An agricultural engineer is going to be a great benefit to the farmers of this Province," said Mr. Harvey Douglas (L. Sec. and Kings) in speaking on the Draft Address in the Legislature yesterday.

Mr. Douglas said that from talking to the newly appointed engineer, he found that his work involves a thorough knowledge of all types of farm machinery, mixing of cement for farm buildings and the proper timbers to use in farm construction. He explained that this man was in a position to apply scientific knowledge in a practical way that would increase the efficiency of farm machinery and lead to a better informed farming population.

He warmly congratulated the move of the address of the Speech from the Throne, Mr. J. A. Gallant. He said, "Mr. Gallant's political affiliations have been questioned since he came into this House, but I want you to know that when he was a fighter bomber pilot overseas, his politics were never questioned and I can say that if he does as good a job in the Government as he did in the last, he will leave nothing to be desired. I believe he will find it easier to get elected if he sticks with the Liberal Party."

people in these outlying districts who are now receiving the benefit of taxes from Parkdale will vote to stay in the unit and the people of Parkdale will vote to get out of it so matters will be no better off than before.

He noted that the sewage and water conditions had been brought to the attention of the Government in 1953 and at that time it was promised that something would be done. "But nothing has been done yet," he added.

The Government's announcement that an engineer would make a survey of the district, he felt was not enough. "They have already been told that a water and sewage system would cost several hundred thousand dollars and another engineer will probably tell them the same thing but there will still be nothing done to better the situation," he said.

Mr. Douglas moved the adjournment of the House which will meet today at 3:00 p.m.

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION

Mr. Douglas said that he was possibly the only member of the House who did not have electric power passing by his home but he was sure that it would come within a short time. He was glad to see that the program had progressed so favorably and felt that it would be of great benefit to the farmers of Prince Edward Island. Referring to the Opposition criticism that the line was too expensive, Mr. Douglas pointed out that electricity was something that the farmer used every day and compared to a piece of machinery, such as a binder, that was used only once a year, it was not nearly so expensive. "We would never have gotten electricity had it not been for the Government's rural electrification policy," he said.

"There is no justification for curtailment of railway service in this Province, when we have so little service at the present time," said Mr. Douglas. Referring to the passenger service he noted that it consisted of one passenger car at the end of a freight train and the schedules in most cases called for the arrival of the train in Charlottetown at 11 a.m. and leaving at 2:30 p.m. He said that if the Railway intended to take off scheduled trains and give the Province a casual freight service, farmers would suffer as a result. In this connection he made specific reference to one instance—that of icing cars—"How can a shipper know when to ice a carload of vegetables when it is not known when the car is going to move. You might ice it today and in four or five days the car is still on the line and has to be re-iced before it leaves the shipping point."

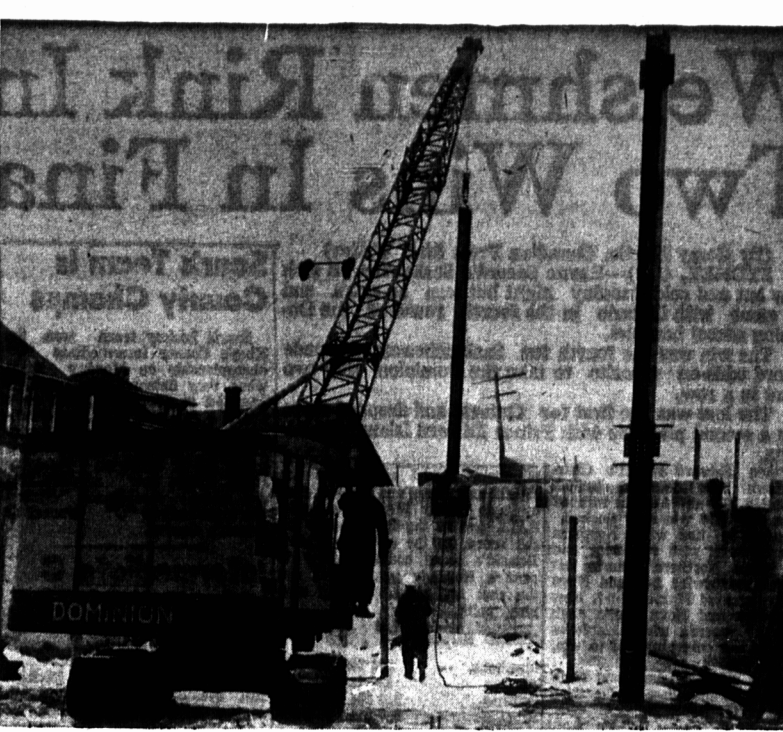
In the semi-finals, a series of three games were played, the All Stars winning two and the Lobster Kings winning one.

"The regular monthly meeting of the Montague Fire Brigade was held on Monday evening in the Town Hall with Fire Chief Doug Coffin presiding.

On a motion by Cpl. Don Davis, seconded by Spencer Llewellyn, it was passed unanimously that a vote of thanks be extended to Ken Clements, John Shaw, Ralph Beck, Doug Coffin and Joe Vuozzo for the outstanding work they did in renovating the operational room of the fire station.

A report was given by Gilbert Clements regarding the cost of a buzzer system and switches for the fire trucks. Following this a brief discussion was held on the First Aid course which will be given to the brigade in March under the directorship of Gilbert Clements and John Shaw.

A lengthy discussion took place on the shortage of water for fire fighting purposes in the north section of Montague. Allan Nelson and Spencer Llewellyn were appointed to make arrangements for a very special evening at the next meeting.
