SKETCH OF PUGWASH.—An interesting historical sketch of Pugwash, N. S. has been contributed by Mr. Charles H. Black, of Charlottetown, to the brochure featuring the Gathering of the Clans and Fishermen's Regatta at Pugwash this year. The event took place on July 1st. The historical details, as given by Mr. Black, are of permanent value and include reference to some of his forebears, one of whom, Rufus F. Black, is believed to have been the first white child born in Pugwash. An early survey and plan of the town was made by another relative, Lieut. Col. James Black, who received a grant of land there from the Nova Scotia Government in the early 1800's. Bound copies of the article have been placed with the Charlottetown and P. W. C. Carnegie libraries.

Strange But True

Men are driven by various ambitions. In Yugoslavia, Josef Stakios, aged 77, had an ambition to dig 1,000 graves in a certain cemetery. He did. But as he took out the last spadeful of earth, he dropped dead, and was interred in his 1,000th grave.
