Marshfield WI Produces Winning Safety Suggestion

Marshfield Women's Institute wins \$40.00 safety award presented by the P.E.I. Safety Council for what is considered the best safety idea presented by a women's group in the past year. The winning entry was a reflectorized arm band for nocturnal pedestrians. In September, 1964, about the time the P.E.I. Safety Council was formed, an anonymous donor placed \$40.00 with the Safety Council to be awarded to any women's group producing the best suggestion or device for safety on our highways. This information was passed along to various Institutes and other groups throughout the Province. One stipulation was that the winning suggestion must be something actually tried and proven practical. The Safety Council executive were to act as judges. Many excellent suggestions were submitted from all parts of the Island which meant a lot of careful screening and consideration. Finally the Marsh-

field suggestion for the reflectorized arm bands was chosen. These arm bands are easily put on or removed as they are held in place by two small snaps. They reflect the headlights of a motor vehicle back to the driver very strongly and can be seen for almost a quarter of a mile. The bands may be removed and folded into pocket or purse for convenience, are practically weightless and not bulky. The Marshfield WI has produced dozens of these pedestrian safety devices in the past year and there have been many favorable comments concerning them. During that time, these simple, inexpensive arm bands are known to have saved at least three pedestrians from mishap, as well as serving to remind both pedestrians and motorists of their individual safety. The presentation was made to Mrs. W. Wood, president of the Marshfield Women's Institute by P.W. Barlow, safety officer for the province, on behalf of the P.E.I. Safety Council.
