

Declares A-Bomb Can Be Used On Battlefield

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 — (AP) — An eyewitness said yesterday the latest atomic bomb blast over the Nevada desert "looked big enough to destroy an enemy division" on the battlefield.

Representative Albert Gore (Dem., Penn.), chairman of a House of representatives atomic energy sub-committee, said he and four other congress members witnessed the explosion Tuesday from "several miles away."

He told newspaper men: "The atomic bomb can now be used on the field of battle. They are no longer mysterious uncertainties — they are now specific, accurate and certain."

Gore indicated that the congress members would have been in danger if they had been as close as five miles to the dual-action blast which was reported felt 130 miles away.

Official secrecy blacked out any technical disclosures on the apparently new type of bomb exploded — the 20th major United States atomic blast — but Gore commented: "A-bombs are now specific as

to type and purpose, accurate in delivery to the point of precision, and certain as to detonation and devastating effect."

The fourth in the series of test explosions is scheduled for tomorrow and is expected to involve troops in experiments with smaller atomic weapons.

Pictures At Church Services Cure Dozing

NEW YORK, Nov. 2 — (AP) — Some people who used to nod in church now stay awake.

Because, said Rev. Leon V. Kofod, they are being shown, as well as told, the teachings of the scriptures.

"We are educated to think in terms of pictures," he said. "Their use — properly handled — is 10 times as attractive as words alone."

Mr. Kofod, of the Woodmere Methodist Church here, is one of thousands of ministers throughout the United States who have begun using films in church services.

Although the pulpit, the sermons, the hymns and the Sunday-School recitals remain basic standbys of worship services, many major denominations now consider films a vital adjunct.

"Churches, in the contemporary world, have found they must use the best contemporary known means of reaching the minds and hearts of men," said Dr. Albert D. Stauffer, head of the Congregational-Christian Church Missions Council.

Denominations which formerly were wary of "picture shows" in the church have set up audiovisual departments. Film projectors have become almost standard equipment in the meeting rooms of synagogues and churches.

William Rogers, head of the Religious Film Association central agency, said about 50,000 churches now get films from the agency "more or less regularly," he said.

Many denominations make films of their own — with experts hired to do the job. Numerous movie companies have sprung up specifically to put the stories of the Bible on film.

Newly launched is an organization of lay Roman Catholics — Hollywood directors, writers and technicians — to produce and distribute films with a spiritual message.

The types of pictures vary — silent filmstrips with written texts, slides with recorded sound, and sound movies, some feature-length, to be integrated with lessons.



EDEN TO KEY POST IN NEW BRITISH GOVERNMENT

Handsome Anthony Eden, who was appointed British Foreign Secretary in Winston Churchill's new Conservative Government, a post which he held for five years in Churchill's war cabinet, is shown with his son Nicholas in London during the recent campaign. At 54, Mr. Eden now ranks as one of Britain's elder statesmen and "their apparent" to 76-year-old Winston Churchill's leadership of the Conservative party. In addition to the post of Foreign Secretary in which he replaces Herbert Morrison, Mr. Eden will be deputy Prime Minister and leader of the House of Commons. When first named as Foreign Secretary in 1935, Eden, then only 37, was the youngest Briton to hold that post in 80 years.

One of the men replied: "We know that land so well, ma'am, why we even used to steal robins' eggs without a soul but yourself knowing it."

Princess Elizabeth laughed heartily.

Schooner Sails On Treasure Hunt

GOSPORT, Hampshire, England, Nov. 2 — (CP) — Flying a jaunty Jolly Roger flag and cheered by crowds on shore, the two-masted schooner yacht Lamorna set out today on a story-book search for buried treasure.

In sparkling sunshine, the Lamorna cast anchor and threaded its way through a maze of Royal Navy warships into the open sea, starting a six-month voyage fraught with the promise of adventure and peril.

The 12-man party, including three Canadians, is headed for the South China Sea and a tiny island supposed to contain a treasure cache left behind by Captain William Kidd, the 17th century pirate. Parchment maps which the party will pick up at Singapore indicate the gold is buried on the island, 200 miles south of Thailand.
