Sergeant Monteith joined the RCAF in May of 1944 and has served in various stations across Canada and Overseas. While Overseas he was attached to No. 4 Fighter Wing in Germany and when the former CAS A-M C.R. Slemmon visited RCAF Installations in Europe, Monteith was chosen as driver for the A-M's tour of Germany.

Driving is by no means new to Monteith for he was driver and private owner of a transport B.P. prior to his enlistment in the R.C.A.F. since his enlistment he has served as driver and chauffeur of various motor vehicles ranging from jeeps and cars to heavy trucks and buses. Twice during his service career Sgt. Monteith has placed first in the Tri-Service Canada Wide Safe and Skilled Driving Competition yearly in Toronto.

He is married to the former Jean Estey of Durham Bridge, N.B. They have two children, Anne, 17, and Roberta, 16. At present the family is residing in RCAF Station Summerside Married Quarters.

His vast and varied skill and experience in safe-handling of motor vehicles has no doubt contributed greatly to having Sgt. Monteith selected, once again, as chauffeur for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh during their second tour of Canada.

Journal Pioneer To Publish Five Times Weekly

The Journal Pioneer, a tabloid sized newspaper, published three times weekly in Summerside, will increase their publications to five times weekly, effective next Tuesday.

The announcement was made yesterday by the managing director of the Journal Publishing Co. Ltd., Mr. John Mungall, who said that plans have been completed to commence publishing every afternoon from Monday through Friday. He said substantial changes would be made in content and format of the paper, a teletype wire service is being established with British United Press, more news and features will be carried, and the paper will sell at five cents a copy.

Mr. Mungall said that during the last five years the company had installed much new equipment, and the plant is well equipped. It has been anticipated since the amalgamation of the Journal and the Pioneer in 1951 but planning has been intensified since 1955.

However, the Journal Publishing Company, Ltd. expanded its activities a year ago when the Irwin Printing Co. Ltd. was acquired in Charlottetown, and this made it necessary to defer entry into the daily field, Mr. Mungall said.

The editor of the paper is Mr. J. Elmer Murphy.

Street Riots Flare 5th Night In Polish Capitol

WARSAW (AP) — Riot police charged a crowd of whistling youths outside the Warsaw Palace of Culture Monday night in the fifth straight night of street fighting here.

About 100 police scattered the crowd with clubs after a teen-age gang set fire to a wooden flower kiosk. Forty persons were reported arrested.

Riot squads with Alsatian dogs stood guard at the intersection of Jerozolimska and Marshalkowka streets, a focal point of the clashes.

The crowd numbered about 1,000. It was smaller than those of previous evenings and contained a high proportion of the rowdies the Poles call "chuliganski."

Authorities whipped up a press campaign demanding severe sentences for demonstrators.

This army of stone-throwing brawlers must be defeated and the gully ones arrested and meted severe criminal punishment," said the youth newspaper Sztandar Mlodocyh.

Urges NATO Cooperation In Scientific Research

By ARCH MACKENZIE Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP)—Prime Minister Diefenbaker said Monday he believes Russia's feat in launching a satellite means "the free nations — and particularly those in NATO—must co-operate in making larger financial resources available to scientists."

Such steps would mean that free world scientists "will not be fettered by improvident considerations of false economy when weighed on the scales of survival."

The prime minister spoke to the Founder's Day convocation at McGill University, where he was one of five recipients of honorary degrees.

"I should not be surprised if one of you penetrates the outer spaces," Mr. Diefenbaker told the graduates.

The non-realities of space fiction had become reality with the Russian man-made moon and it presented a challenge to the graduates and to the free world.

It did the free world no disservice, Mr. Diefenbaker said, "to acknowledge this triumph of technology and pay tribute where it is due."

MOBILIZED STATE But Russia had mobilized science for the state and its purposes "with the terrible objective of ultimate domination of all mankind." There was information to the effect that numbers of Russian graduates in science this year would exceed the total in the free world.

Russia's methods must not and could not be copied in a democracy but they must not ignore the challenge. Without making materialism their guiding principle, universities of the free world "must plan to make provision for the encouragement of a material increase in the numbers of undergraduates who, having the ability, will enter engineering and applied science courses."

The sky was the limit in Russia for expenditures on such objectives as the satellite now winging around the earth. Hence, Mr. Diefenbaker said, it was his view that larger resources must be made available in the democracies for such work.

Canada And The U. S. Take Fresh Look At Trade Problems

Canadian Press Staff Writer WASHINGTON (CP)—Canada and the United States took a fresh look Monday at some of the irritants, largely of American origin, which beset their economic relations.

A four-man cabinet committee from Ottawa, led by Finance Minister Donald Fleming, sat down with State Secretary Dulles and three other U.S. cabinet secretaries to exchange views on what can be done to solve the problem.

The talks at the state department will continue through Tuesday.

Fleming told reporters after Monday's sessions that the discussions were conducted "with the utmost frankness on both sides and in the friendliest possible spirit. He declined to indicate what specific subjects were considered but said "we covered a lot of ground."

The joint Canada-U.S. committee on trade and economic affairs is an inter-government cabinet

group set up in 1953 and then pigeon-holed after two meetings. It was revived following the election of the Progressive Conservative government.

"OF GREAT IMPORTANCE" A state department announcement said the talks are regarded as "of great importance" because they provide a chance "for fuller understanding and speedier progress toward the solution of economic problems affecting Canada and the United States."

Chief item on the agenda appeared to be Canada's complaint that U.S. methods of disposing of surplus wheat are undermining Canadian markets. Prime Minister Diefenbaker has accused the Americans of using "fire-sale" methods to unload surpluses built up through the use of high domestic price supports.

U.S. sources said the Canadians formally launched their complaint on this score. Both sides were reported to have a better understanding after the five-hour meetings.

At the regular meeting of the Kensington Lions Club held at the home of Dr. L.K. Zielski, many activities for Kensington Lions were planned. Say Charges By Faubus Ridiculous

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Arkansas Governor Orval Faubus said Monday federal troops have invaded girls' dressing rooms while enforcing racial integration at Central High School but the White House denied it.

He noted that some members were absent, and that the attendance committee chairman Allen Champion, had become a proud father.

"Completely untrue and also completely vulgar," said James C. Hagerly, White House press secretary.

The governor said he based his statement on complaints from parents.

School Superintendent Virgil T. Blossom said "the federal troops are not following the girls into the dressing rooms."

Assistant Superintendent Fred Graham branded the charge as "ridiculous."

He called it wholly unwarranted to have federal soldiers change for gym activities.

The governor suggested the White House send a detachment of WACS if it thinks close surveillance is necessary to integrate nine Negro students.

The governor outlined his complaint in a letter to Maj.-Gen. Edwin A. Walker, in charge of regular army paratroopers and federalized Arkansas National Guardsmen at the school.

Press Secretary Hagerly said Walker returned the letter to Faubus unopened because it was addressed to "the commander of the occupation forces."

Treat N.S. Plates Against Rust HALIFAX (CP)—E. S. Campbell, provincial registrar of motor vehicles, said Monday Nova Scotia's 1958 licence plates will be treated to resist rust and erosion from salt on highways during winter months. The 1958 plates will have yellow figures on a black background.

Satellite Is Near Toronto 4 Times Daily

TORONTO (CP)—Radio interference blocked attempts by the Dunlap Observatory to pick up signals from the Russian earth satellite about 2 a.m. ADT today when it was due to pass near Toronto.

Dr. John Heard, observatory director, said no further attempts up the rapid "beep" signal from the satellite which passes near Toronto four times each day. The signals were heard on the observatory and Sunday mornings.

Dr. Heard said the satellite passes near Toronto at approximately 12.40 a.m., 2.30 a.m., 2.55 a.m. and 10.25 a.m. ADT. He said the satellite's north-south orbit, at angles to the earth's west-east spin, causes it to pass over different parts of the earth on each 98-minute revolution.
