THE ALBERTON EXHIBITION.

The enterprise, energy and success of the leading men of Alberton and vicinity in respect to their annual exhibition have been sufficiently proved. There is undoubtedly a demand on the part of districts far away from Charlottetown, Summerside and Georgetown, or not easily accessible thereto, for exhibitions of their own to which their big cattle can be driven and their ordinary products carried, and at which they can compare notes and discuss one another's methods. So strong is this desire that, as in the case of such thriving sections of country as Alberton and Crapaud, the people are ready to put their hands into their own pockets and put up the money required, rather than not have them. The value of such meetings and friendly competitions has been demonstrated in England, the States and the neighboring Provinces, as well as here. But the people of Alberton and Crapaud contend that it is unfair that they should have to bear the whole brunt of the expense of their exhibitions, while those of Summerside, Georgetown and Charlottetown are subsidized by the Government; and they demand a change. The Rev. Father Burke, writing from Alberton to the Agriculturalist, puts the case forcibly for the people of Alberton. If, he says in effect, the county grant is to be continued, we have proven our right and title to it in whole every year, or in part every year—at Alberton; if this is not to be continued, then the Government can supplement the amount raised by either end of the County by a like amount and thus help those who help themselves! Should Alberton be further ignored after its pluck and enterprise in the past, and made to continue its present system of subsidizing the fund for its exhibitions, then every other section should be obliged to do likewise. The points here stated are worthy of consideration, and will, without doubt, be discussed by the Legislature, in view of the termination this year of the period during which our Exhibition companies are to receive annual Legislative grants. It will be admitted that our agriculturists should receive encouragement and stimulus towards improved methods of farming and better breeding. The value of exhibitions in this respect, and the demand there is for them, render it improbable that the grants will be withdrawn. False as they have been in their duty to the farmers, the Government will hardly dare to imperil the continuance of annual agricultural exhibitions. It is rather more probable that public opinion will force them to lead some aid to bona fide exhibitions held in outlying settlements—such as those of Alberton and Crapaud—whose people are willing to subscribe a portion of the money required, and have the ability to hold annual exhibitions.

THE TUNNEL BORINGS.

"W. M. T." writing in the St. John Sun, in a pleasant trip to this Island, gives these facts relative to the borings: "Last summer they began, somewhat late it is true, but they worked some weeks. This year they had been setting up their machinery again, but just as they had got their tripod erected and prepared to bore down through one of the legs, a storm came and overthrew the whole structure. The remainder of the summer they spent largely in trying to grapple their machinery from the bottom of the shaft. Lately they have suspended work for the rest of the season. Up to date they have bored no holes at all. Fortunately, payment is by results, and the country loses nothing. The firm will probably make further attempts, so that they may get some compensation for all their work and expense."

We understand that Mr. McEae will attempt to effect some of the requisite borings through the board ice this winter. At all events, the delay is no fault of the Government, which is endeavoring to get the necessary data upon which to decide whether or not we are to have a grant for the tunnel.

—Mr. S. D. Scott, editor of the St. John Sun, in his "Walking tour through P. E. Island," says:

New Glasgow, a few miles away, on the north coast, is the home of an eminent man, a preacher like Gordon, a student and author like Schurman. Cornelius O'Brien was a bright lad when he was selected as worthy of a course at St. Dunstan's. Afterwards he pursued his studies in the College of the Propaganda at Rome, where he was made a doctor. Before he was forty he was translated from a comparatively humble station as a parish priest in a small Prince Edward Island coast settlement to the head of the archdiocese of Halifax. It was a great thing for the young man to be suddenly placed in authority over hundreds of his fellow priests, and even over the good bishop to whose authority he had rendered the cheerful obedience due to a superior, and the personal respect and love due to a friend and helper. Dr. Schurman was president of Cornell at thirty-five, and Dr. O'Brien archbishop of Halifax at thirty-nine.

NEWS NOTES.

The reign of Victoria has seen the proportion of English people who cannot write their names reduced from forty-one per cent, to seven per cent. The revenues of the United States government have fallen off about \$13,000,000, in round figures, for the first fourteen days of September, compared with the last half of August. The falling off in revenue is pointed out to be due to the enormous sums paid off the whiskey, which was withdrawn for consumption just before the new tariff act, increasing the taxes from 90 cents to \$1.10 per gallon, went into effect August 23rd.

THE ALBERTON EXHIBITION.

A List of the Prizes Awarded.

So much of THE EXAMINER'S space was taken up yesterday with the reports of the addresses to the Lieutenant-Governor, and an abstract of His Honor's replies thereto—somehow marred in transmission,—that we had no space for a report concerning the animals and articles on exhibition. These were in point of number and quality highly creditable to the people of Alberton and vicinity. Woodman's large hall, which was tastefully decorated with autumn leaves, etc., contained a large variety of splendid products of the farmers' lands and the plastic needles and looms. Perhaps the most noticeable exhibit was that of the fruit which was set forth tempting upon a table which ran the length of the room. The apples particularly were, some of them very large and some of them excellent in quality. Altogether the most numerous of the exhibits was roots and vegetables. We have not seen finer potatoes upon exhibition, nor much, if any, larger turnips. There were also more splendid samples of celery and other products of the garden. The grain, butter, honey and fancy work exhibits were all good. We were particularly pleased with the prominence given to fodder corn, showing that the people of the West are alive to the importance of supplementing the ordinary food supply of their cattle.

Owing to the disagreeable weather the horses and cattle did not show to the best advantage. But although we have it upon no less authority than that of Dr. Jenkins, who was judge, that the horses were not quite up to the standard of last year, the cattle, sheep and pigs would have done credit to any Province.
