**Woman's Despair Eased
By Reader's Example**

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: Thank you for publishing the fine letter from EG, the twice divorced man, kicked about by fate in his childhood and youth; reluctantly obliged to retire in his early fifties, deeply depressed by this for a time, who now finds peace pervading his outlook as never before.
