Ban Inspection Seen Less Needed

OTTAWA (CP) — Dr. Brock Chisholm, former director-general of the World Health Organization, says there is much less need now for a system of international inspection to police any world ban on nuclear tests.

He says scientific equipment now possessed by Russia and the United States could detect all nuclear blasts except perhaps small under-ground detonations.

"There is much less need today for a system of inspection," Dr. Chisholm told a press conference Friday in his capacity of honorary president of the World Federalists, one of a number of organizations opposed to nuclear armaments.

However, there was a feeling in Washington that the U.S. would lose face if it changed its demand that a world ban on nuclear tests be accompanied by an international system of inspection.

He said political considerations resulted in the resumption of American nuclear testing in the atmosphere. There was no military reason because the U.S. had already said it had enough nuclear weapons to destroy Russia.

"There is much less need today for a system of inspection," Dr. Chisholm told a press conference Friday in his capacity of honorary president of the World Federalists, one of a number of organizations opposed to nuclear armaments.

Fishing On Private Property Costs Two Men \$10 Fines

Two persons, John MacPherson, Cherry Valley, and Stephen Compton, Little Sands, both pleaded guilty to fishing trout on private property, and were each fined \$10 and costs or five days in jail by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County magistrates court yesterday afternoon.

With argument completed by counsel, John P. Nicholson for the defence, and Alan K. Scates for the prosecution, David Leonard Gallant, Charlottetown, was remanded until May 18 for judgement.

Gallant is charged with driving while his abilities were impaired by alcohol, to which he earlier pleaded not guilty.

One more defence witness was heard in the case of C. Blair Livingston, Sherwood, and he was then remanded until May 11. The accused, who is counselled by Lester O'Donnell, is charged with driving while impaired by alcohol. The prosecution is being conducted by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan.

Two persons pleaded guilty to having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences and each was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days in jail.

A fine of \$5 and costs or two days was imposed on a person who pleaded guilty to driving a motor vehicle with faulty equipment.

A similar fine was imposed on another person on a charge of driving a motor vehicle while not being the holder of a license.

FISH LANDED BY DRAGGER

SOURIS — The MV "Virginia Ann" landed some 60,000 pounds of fish, consisting of cod, flounder and haddock, here yesterday.

The vessel is captained by Kyrn Keus and had been fishing in the Gulf of St. Lawrence.

All but one of the 20 boats of the Souris fleet are now at the fishing grounds and it is expected that the remaining boat will be joining the other by the weekend.

When Fisheries have started processing the first fish of 1962 and operations at Eastern Fisheries are expected to commence Monday with the arrival of the MV Iceland.

(Continued from Page 1) but that the matter had almost reached that stage. The fact that fishermen are sprawled over such a big territory and are not organized made any united stand difficult. He suggested the fisheries department might get the fishermen's opinion on the matter.

Last year the opening date was extended in the face of unusually severe ice conditions. A bid by a Prince Edward Island group for an extension this year was turned down on the grounds that the other two provinces involved had not asked.

The cream of the lobster crop is usually taken in "three, four, or five weeks," Mr. Brody said. A later opening would mean a heavy catch in the Northumberland Strait district early in May, while catches are heavy from the Nova Scotia Eastern Shore season which opens April 10, tends to flood the big New England market and drive the price down. A later opening in the Northumberland Strait would mean the catches had probably started to dwindle on the Eastern Shore.

Fisheries officials in Halifax declined to comment on the possibility of an extended season opening. A report from P.E.I. said it appears the suggestion would not get much support. Fishermen in the St. Lawrence, N.B., area were reported to be against a later opening.

One report said they would favor a "shortening of the season at the end," however.

About 15,000,000 pounds of lobsters are landed each year in the area involved. The landed value is often more than \$5,000,000 with the marketed value about \$2,000,000.
